Superintendent's Message

District Hosts Informational Forum

On Monday, Nov. 2, the District hosted an Informational Forum for parents, community and staff on the NYS Standards and Assessments. We partnered with staff from Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES on a very informative discussion and presentation on these topics. So that our students are successful and are better able to achieve their goals, it is important that we all have the knowledge and understanding of the standards and assessments which will enable us to better assist each student. As parents, it becomes extremely important that you are aware of these topics so that you can better assist your child at home. The standards are designed so that all students, regardless of where they live or attend school, are receiving instruction based on a set of common standards. They provide a roadmap for teachers, parents and students. Prior to the common standards, there was no link between what fourth grade students in various parts of the country were receiving in math or ELA. Embedded in all of this is the latitude that all teachers have in creating curriculum designed to meet each standard. Standards are the "what" and the curriculum is the "how."

Once we have provided classroom instruction in accordance with the state standards and local curriculum, it is imperative that we assess how well each student has grasped the content. Over the years, it has been the assessments that have received much criticism from educators and parents alike. Personally, I believe that the state does recognize this and will work at both the state and local levels to promote a greater understanding of the assessments, as well as

constructing assessments that yield the highest level of feedback to both educators and parents about student progress on what students should know and be able to do. The important thing is that we all work together so that our children in Holley are recipients of good, solid, rigorous instruction and that we continue to work together to analyze student assessment data and adjust classroom instruction in accordance with academic needs.

Student test scores in Holley have turned the corner and are moving in the right direction. Each school has a School Improvement Team which is made up of teachers and support staff, parents, school board members, students (where applicable), and administrators. These teams meet regularly throughout the school year and their sole purpose is to improve the academic performance of all students. This must be our major focus going forward - making sure that each and every child is successful academically. Please continue to work with us, as the schools cannot accomplish this in isolation. Research indicates that in schools where there is solid communication and cooperation between home and school, there is a much greater probability for student success. Please feel free to contact your child's teacher or principal at any time when you have questions. Our kids are worth whatever it takes!

MS/HS Houses Orleans County Mental Health Satellite Office

In response to the national concern about mental health issues and the impact they have on student performance and school district climates, Holley Central School District has partnered with Orleans County Mental Health to offer a satellite office at the MS/HS two days a week. Nicole Ashton, an Orleans County Mental Health Counselor, works out of the satellite office at Holley on Wednesdays and Fridays from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. "This is a real boost for our side of the county to offer mental health services here," said Holley Superintendent Robert D'Angelo. "This saves our families travel time to come here instead of Albion, plus it augments the services provided by our district's counseling staff. By having the satellite office at the MS/HS, students can use the services provided to help them concentrate on their studies and be positive contributors in school. This new service opportunity also encourages our parents to further engage with the district on students' academic issues."

Since Oct. 7, Ashton has begun to make assessments of students, offer counseling appointments and give referrals to other mental health professionals to help address the needs

of students and their families. Students are referred to her by Holley faculty and staff or a parent/guardian request. After receiving the referral or request, she begins the process by obtaining parent/guardian permission and insurance information, then scheduling an hour-long initial assessment. Once the assessment is complete, she works with the student's schedule to make regular appointments. For appointments scheduled after school, students can utilize the 5 p.m. bus for a ride home.

"The school district support here in Holley is amazing," said Ashton. "I have been welcomed by the students and staff. The district personnel have been helpful with providing information on students and tracking their progress. I'm here to serve the needs of the students and families, so I try to be flexible to set appointments with the hours and days that fit their schedules." Ashton has a Master's degree as a Licensed

Veterans Day Assembly at Holley Elementary

The annual Veterans Day assembly at Holley Elementary School on Nov. 10 featured veterans, flags, music and poetry. The largest turnout of local veterans yet sat in a designated area of the audience, while a few sat with their students during the assembly. The guest speaker was former U.S. Marine Chris Vigliotti, who now works for the Veterans Outreach Center. Vigliotti was formerly a security guard at Holley last year. He talked about the difference between Memorial Day and Veterans Day. "I like to call them heroes, not veterans," said Vigliotti. He told the students that the Marine Corps was established 240 years ago on November 10, 1775. He called up a group of students he nicknamed the "Rough Riders" to help him present a gift to the Elementary School. He had a flag flown over the Pentagon and it was certified in honor of Holley. "In my short time in Holley, I was impressed with the passion and dedication to patriotism of country and community that you have," he said.

A group of local veterans from the American Legion and VFW posted and retired the colors to begin and end the assembly. The Elementary Chorus sang while the Band played the "The Star-Spangled Banner." Students from Sheri Viscardi's class played the glockenspiels and xylophones to accompany the Chorus singing "America." A poem was read by students in Wil Prince and Karen Quaranto's class. Sixth graders Justin VanAmeron and Thomas Dobri played "Taps" and "Bugle Call," respectively, on their trumpets. After the assembly, the honored military guests were invited for refreshments provided by Food Service Director Vickie Scroger.



Art Students Complete Illuminated Letters Project

Students in Evinn Neadow's Drawing and Painting class recently completed an illuminated letters project, where they used the first letter of their first name as their focal point. Their artwork mirrored the illuminated manuscripts that were created during the Middle Ages in handwritten books. During that time period, gold leaf was applied to letters and images that were incorporated into the text, thus making them reflect light and appear "glow." An illuminated letter was the first letter on a page and would often be decorated with details and elements from the text. Many illuminated manuscripts included detailed borders to enhance the beauty of the artwork on the page.

The students' artwork represented autobiographies of themselves, as they incorporated images that symbolized them and their interests around the letters.



Global Studies 2 Students Debate Revolutions

Students in Matt Hennard's Global Studies 2 classes conducted debates in November about the Industrial Revolution versus the Modern Technological Revolution in the MS/HS Auditorium. The 10th grade students researched each revolution and then were split into teams to represent each revolution. Hennard instructed students to prepare examples of how life changed in each revolution. The teams prepared opening and closing statements and asked and answered questions from the opposite team, trying to persuade each other and the audience that one revolution had more of an impact on society than the other.

The students appeared very knowledgeable and passionate in their arguments. Teacher Mike Crissman agreed. "They did an excellent job explaining both sides," said Crissman. "The handouts they distributed illustrated a lot of the positives of their revolutions, rather than the negatives." The students on each team, as well as the ninth and 12th graders in the audience, completed feedback forms on the performance of each team. They also had a chance to evaluate themselves as a team and

as individuals. Hennard said that the feedback forms will determine the winner of the debate in each class period.

The debate came about as a way for the social studies department to assess what students were learning after spending time studying these historic events. "Why would a 10th grader involved in the current technological revolution care about what happened to a kid in the Industrial Revolution?" said Lorena Stabins, Staff Developer from Monroe/Orleans Accountability, Assessment and Reporting Services (M.A.A.R.S.). "By getting students involved in a debate where



they can compare something they live every day against something they've just learned about, it helps them make connections to the past and today." Stabins said the assessment process was developed through the Teaching is the Core grant that Holley received last year.




