FIRE PREVENTION AT HOLLEY ELEMENTARY





The Clarendon, Holley and Hulberton Fire Departments demonstrated to the Pre-K-3 students at Holley Elementary School what to do in case of a fire. The students practiced stop, drop and roll; went through a simulated fire in a safety house; watched a fireman put on his protective gear; and learned about the different tools on the fire trucks. The firefighters didn't want the children to be afraid of them in their full gear. 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


A Message from the Superintendent

Keeping Away From That Nasty Flu Bug



He hopes to land a job where he will be working in a help desk, analytics or technician role.

He said the staff is very nice to work with and he likes working for the Holley school district. He has spent two years working for the district and hopes to continue working on a part-time basis until he finishes his degree. After graduation, he hopes to land a system administrator job.

Holley Students are on the Move as Part of the PEP Grant

Tf your child was randomly selected to wear a movable band, they received a letter indicating the reporting requirements for the Carol M. White Physical Education Program (PEP) grant that Holley has received. Students in grades K-4 wear the bands for four days and students in grades 5-12 wear the bands for seven days. The device tracks moves and miles, and the students were asked to aim for 11,000 moves each day. They must turn in their bands to their physical education teacher at the end of their collection period so they can record the results. The next collection periods will be in February and May 2015 and students will be randomly selected to participate in each of these collection periods.

FIT4U! Fall Session

The fall session of the FIT4U! program began Oct. 20, offering free activities for students in the Elementary School (ES) and Middle School/High School (MS/HS). Students in grades 3-6 can participate in African Dance on Thursdays or students in grades 1-6 can participate in Bowling/Walking/Jogging for Fitness/Circuit Training on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Both sessions run from 3:30-5 p.m. and students can ride the 5 p.m. bus home.

MS/HS students can participate in Speed/Agility, Hand-Eye Coordination, and Cardiovascular Endurance from 6-7 a.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. They can also participate in Zumba and Yoga from 2:45-4:15 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Students can ride the 5 p.m. bus home after the Zumba and Yoga session. All programs end on Dec. 19.

Yes, teens READ! And so do their teachers!

uring the months of September and October, Holley MS/HS students and staff visited the library to have their READ pictures taken. From those pictures, READ posters were produced and posted in the display case right outside the library to encourage others to read.

"First Rate Reads" was a project Julie Wantuck, a ninth grade English teacher, initiated, asking students and staff for the names of books they read over the summer. The book covers were included on the sign in the display case. The sign was made by Brandi Zavitz and Nicole Rowley, MS/HS art teachers.

In 2004, the National Endowment for the Arts published a study entitled "Reading At Risk: A Survey of Literary Reading in America," concluding that we were a nation in crisis. The Harry Potter novels changed all that, and now young adult publishing is the fastest growing segment of the publishing market, with books such as The Hunger Games trilogy, Diary of a Wimpy Kid series and "The Fault in Our Stars" selling copies in the millions. Books are not only accepted in our current culture, but embraced and celebrated!



In the month of September alone, the Holley MS/HS Library increased circulation by 25 percent with our seventh graders checking out the new-to-them audiobook options, Playaways. Many students were drawn to the 250 new books in the fiction and nonfiction collections, which we displayed throughout the library. Last year alone, our students checked out over 14,000 library materials.

tudents from Holley Middle School/High School also participated in the fire prevention activities.
