They proudly introduced the Holley staff members to their families as part of their extended "family" support system at school. For students whose family members couldn't attend the feast, staff members dined with them. Many of the students proudly wore ties loaned from the staff to add to the festive air of the meal.

The students in the Alt High program are ones who aren't as successful in the structure of traditional high school and benefit from smaller classes and more individual attention. Some of the students transition to attending Holley MS/ HS for part of the day or attend Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES Career and Technical Education for half a day and then spend the rest of their day at the Alt High, which is housed in the Holley Elementary School building. When the students graduate from the Alt High program, many of them attend community college, join the military or accept employment. The students learn to create their own definitions of success and become independent. A lot of them enjoyed the opportunity to showcase their culinary skills at the Thanksgiving Feast.

On behalf of the Board of Education, the students and staff, I would like to thank you for your support of our capital project on Dec. 9. The Phase III portion of the project enables us to take care of some very important needs such as the replacement of rooftop HVAC units which are "aging out," replacement of radiators and water pumps, and a new tennis court and playground. The construction of a bus loop in the front of the elementary school will separate bus from vehicle traffic at arrival and dismissal times, thereby creating a more safe and orderly environment for everyone. These are just some examples of the work which will be completed during this project.

The improvements under Phase III will not only benefit the students and staff, but they will also provide benefits to the community at large. These enhancements will enable the district to become more energy efficient and save money on utility costs through the use of new and more efficient machinery and equipment. For years to come, the community will also be able to enjoy the new tennis courts and playground. The best part of all is once this project is finished, the district will have completed almost \$40 million of capital construction work with zero tax impact. That's an accomplishment that we can all be very proud of. Our physical plant will become the most modern and up-to-date of any school district in Orleans County and that is also quite an accomplishment, considering the state of our physical plant prior to the capital projects. National Honor Society Induction Ceremony

The National Honor Society (NHS) Induction Ceremony occurred on Nov. 25. Eighteen students were inducted based on their application to the faculty selection committee and maintenance of a 90 percent or higher academic average. The students must demonstrate the four qualities of NHS membership: character, scholarship, leadership and service.

The ceremony began with the current NHS members in their red gowns leading a candlelight procession down the main aisles of the High School Auditorium. Current members tapped the shoulders of the new inductees sitting in the audience, who then exited the auditorium to put on their red gowns. The new inductees then joined the current NHS members in seating on the stage. The current inductees' families sat in rows at the back of the stage. The current NHS officers lit the ceremonial candles and described each of the qualities of membership. When each inductee's name was announced, the student received their certificate from Principal Susan Cory and signed their name in the book that maintains a record of every National Honor Society inductee since 1938. Superintendent Robert D'Angelo handed the NHS pin to each student's family member to pin their child to complete the induction.

The guest speaker at the Induction Ceremony was Devon Jedamski, a Holley alum from the graduating class of 2009. He is currently pursuing a Master of Science degree in Aeronautics and Astronautics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and studying jet engines. Jedamski is conducting research in the MIT Gas Turbine Lab in collaboration with Rolls-Royce North America. He will graduate from MIT in June 2015. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from Clarkson University, where he majored in Aeronautical Engineering and Mechanical Engineering. Jedamski has received many academic awards and scholarships, along with his current fellowship from Rolls Royce that provides a full scholarship to MIT and an annual salary. He has also worked for NASA in their Glenn and Langley Research Centers. He credits his time at Holley as providing him with the discipline to reach his goals.



This form must be filled out online and submitted to the colleges by, or preferably before, their due dates in order to be eligible for these programs. **Please note:** Do not access websites that require you to "pay" for their services.

Final tip:

Students planning to apply to **four-year** colleges will need to complete their applications **ASAP**. Those students planning to attend **two-year** colleges should be making appointments to take **placement tests** and meet with advisors if they have already applied and been accepted.

Holley Hosts Chess Match, Academic Challenge Bowl and Masterminds Tournament

n Dec. 4, Holley hosted three different events that tested the mental strength of middle school and high school students from Brockport, Pembroke, Albion, Kendall and Holley. Chess matches occurred in the MS/HS Library. In the 200 Hallway, Academic Challenge Bowl took place in one room between seventh and eighth grade students, while JV and Varsity Masterminds tournaments were going on in other classrooms. Both Academic Challenge Bowl and Masterminds tournaments are played in a format much like Jeopardy. Once a team answers the first question correctly about a certain topic, they have an opportunity to answer more questions in that same category and gain additional points before that round ends and the next topic is introduced, with both teams having an equal opportunity to play in the next round.

In the first Academic Challenge Bowl match, Holley played against Kendall and won; in the second match against Brockport, they lost. In the Masterminds competition, Holley's JV team played against Brockport and lost; in the second match against Kendall, they lost. Holley's Varsity Masterminds team played against Albion and lost; in the second match, they lost against Pembroke on the last question.

Holley has two chess teams, A and B, because of so much student interest. In the first match for Team A, they won against Kendall. In the remaining three matches for Team B, they lost against Albion High School, Brockport and Albion Middle School.

Seventh Graders Use Math Skills to Complete Scavenger Hunt by Patti Gauer, Middle School Math Teacher

n Friday, Dec. 19, seventh grade math students applied their math skills to complete a scavenger hunt through the halls of Holley MS/HS. With the assistance of many Holley faculty and staff members, Patti Gauer's math classes practiced the art of ciphers. A cipher is defined as a method of secret writing using substitution or transposition of letters according to a key.

Students, working in pairs, picked up their first coded message in their math class. Utilizing a decoder ring, a school map and their critical thinking skills, they solved a math problem related to one of the modules that they have worked on in class: ratio and proportional relationships, rational numbers, or expressions and equations. The solution of their problem gave them the shift (the number that tells them how to rotate the decoder ring), which allowed them to break the code and unscramble the secret message. They followed the decoded message to the next location to pick up another cipher. Students worked through their 41 minute math period to solve math problems and decode the secret messages, ultimately returning their decoded messages to their math class. The students and staff thoroughly enjoyed the hunt.

HOLLEY DISTRICT HOSTED GRAND OPENING OF FITNESS CENTER!

It was all about fitness on Dec. 1 when Holley community members came out to celebrate the grand opening of the Holley Family Fitness Center. Students and adults eagerly tried out the iDance pads, treadmills and stationary bikes with virtual reality screens attached.

Holley Board of Education President Brenda Swanger cut the ribbon and officially opened the center, located in the Elementary School. The Fitness Center was made possible through the Carol M. White Physical Education Program (PEP) Grant. The district qualified for almost \$800,000 of federal funding to promote good nutrition and physical exercise among the students, staff and district families.

The Fitness Center is available for use by classes during the school day and by staff when not in use by classes. The Fitness Center is open for family fitness activities on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6-8 p.m. Trained supervisors are on duty during family fitness times to assist participants and to promote a safe and orderly environment in which to work out.

Virtual reality bikes, gaming bikes and interactive treadmills are available in the fitness center, bringing a fun twist to the traditional cardiovascular equipment. Also available are a cross trainer, weight bench, upper body ergometer, adaptive motion trainer and iDance.

Some pieces of equipment are youthsized to enable children ages 10 and older to exercise alongside their family members. Fourth-grader Tia Hoffarth enjoyed running on the treadmill. She is also a member of Holley's Girls on the Run team and said, "I wished we could have practiced on these instead."

The district is pleased to offer such an outstanding fitness center to the students, staff and families. Community members are encouraged to attend one of the family fitness evenings and experience all the center has to offer.
