Holley Students Learn Jump Roping Tricks from "The Rope Master"

Holley elementary students received a visit from "The Rope Master" (aka James Brewster Thompson) and learned some new tricks during their physical education classes on April 9 and 10. Thompson prepared the students to participate in the Jump Rope for Heart fundraiser for the American Heart Association on April 11. He is also a ventriloquist and brought his doll, Ricki, with him to talk to students about the importance of physical fitness and nutrition. The students not only learned how to jump rope from Thompson, but they also watched him demonstrate a few jump rope tricks, too, such as wrapping the rope around one arm, untangling it, and then jumping forwards or backwards over it before wrapping it around his other arm and repeating the process.

Thompson showed students the jump rope he brings with him everywhere he goes. He received it from his high school basketball coach and has been jumping rope ever since. Once his basketball team started jumping rope, they went on to win their championship that year. Thompson went on to be an All-American athlete in judo, sumo wrestling and Greco-Roman wrestling. He even made it to the Olympics and was rated number 2 for judo. He told the students that jumping rope helps with agility, hand-eye coordination and academic performance. Thompson has watched children improve their grades once they begin a jump rope exercise program.

Thompson said he hopes that the money the students raise through the Jump Rope for Heart event will help in the fight against heart disease and stroke, which are the top killers of people today. He encouraged the students to participate in the event throughout their elementary school years. This is the 31st year that Holley has participated in the fundraiser.

The Rope Master put on an amazing performance at the Jump Rope for Heart event. Thompson displayed his incredible strength as he jumped rope with people on his shoulders, did push-ups with one hand and on his fingertips, and had a staff member stand on his stomach while he balanced his head and feet on chairs.


Superintendent's Message In May, We Honor Our Senior Citizens

Capital Project Phase III Update

Holley Central School District has recently been notified that the Capital Project Phase III was approved by the State Education Department (SED). The district is working with SEI Design and Turner Construction on the third and final phase of the Capital Project.

Holley voters approved the third phase of the district's Capital Project on Dec. 9 in a vote of 175-72. The Phase III portion of the project encompasses replacement of rooftop HVAC units, replacement of radiators and water pumps, repairs around windows and doors to prevent leaking, replacement of flooring, installation of new tennis courts and playgrounds, and construction of a bus loop in the front of the elementary school to separate bus from vehicle traffic.

Once this project is complete, the district will have completed almost \$40 million of capital construction work with zero tax impact. That's an accomplishment Holley District Superintendent Robert D'Angelo is very proud of. "Our physical plant will become the most modern and up-to-date of any school district in the area," he said.

The Capital Project Phase III work is projected to begin in the summer of 2015 and will end during the 2016-17 school year. The replacement and upgrade of equipment and machinery at Holley will enable the district to become more energy efficient and save money on utility costs. The community will reap the benefits of playing on new tennis courts and playgrounds for years to come.

District Students Perform in Music Appreciation Concert

Students in grades 4-12 performed in a concert to highlight March as Music in Our Schools Month. The Elementary, Junior High and High School Concert Bands performed the evening of March 26 in the Holley MS/HS Auditorium. The Elementary Concert Band and Chorus staged a repeat performance on Friday, March 27 for the elementary students.

Under the direction of Sally Martin, the Fifth and Sixth Grade Chorus performed "Somewhere Over the Rainbow," followed by "Oye!" in Spanish, with some students providing musical accompaniment. They also sang the Beatles song "Blackbird" and had help from the fourth graders on the song "Cheeseburgers." They ended their

performance with Journey's "Don't Stop Believin'."

Under the direction of Hannah Bock, the Fifth and Sixth Grade Band performed "Stony Creek March" and "The Sound and the Fury." They also played "Ancient Moon" and "Star Wars" (main theme), which were songs they played the night before in combination with the Junior High and High School Concert Bands.

Both concerts gave the students a chance to show off the skills they've learned through many hours of practice. The concerts also demonstrated the musical progression these students can make throughout the years as they advance through the music program at Holley.

Holley Youth Fire Group in Training to Become Future Firefighters

For the last two-and-a-half years, all Holley students in grades 6-12 have had a chance to participate in the Holley Youth Fire Group, in partnership with the Clarendon, Holley and Fancher-Hulberton-Murray (FHM) Fire Departments. They meet Monday nights at the Clarendon Fire Department and learn about being a firefighter. The program runs year-round, with meetings less frequent in the summertime.

Currently, 13 boys and girls are part of the program. Many of them have participated since they were in seventh grade. The students perform room searches, window bailouts, EMS rehabilitation, hose advancements and auto victim extractions. They watch fire safety videos, complete basic CPR and First Aid training, and use thermal cameras as part of their imaging training to find victims in low visibility situations. They visit the Orleans and Monroe County 911 Centers, Mercy Flight in Buffalo and Greater Rochester International Airport to experience crash and rescue simulations. Members also participate in fire department fundraisers. All of these experiences give them hands-on opportunities to see what it is like to be a firefighter and can help them decide if that is something they want to pursue as they get older. Currently, a student has to be 14 years old to join the Clarendon Fire Department as a junior firefighter and 16 years old to join the Holley Fire Department.

Maintaining a good academic standing is part of the requirements for participation in this group. There are firefighters who are also teachers in the three fire departments who are available to help tutor students. If the students are serious about pursuing a career in firefighting or as an emergency responder, they can take college courses to supplement what they are learning in the Holley Youth Fire Group. There are tuition reimbursement programs and scholarships available to the volunteers, and leaders of the group are making sure students take advantage of these opportunities.

Assistant Chief Robert Freida of the Clarendon Fire Department sees this group as filling a gap for students. "This is a great opportunity for kids who aren't academically or athletically inclined," he said. "They participate in a lot of physical activity as part of this group and they are very enthusiastic to learn new aspects of the job." Since the program's inception, one student has joined the Holley Fire Department and four have joined the Clarendon Fire Department. Another student is interested in pursuing a career as an EMT and has worked with other town departments to get more experience in that field.

The Youth Fire Group was featured in February on Time Warner Cable News (<http://www.twcnews.com/nys/rochester/news/2015/02/24/clarendon-fire-department.html>). They also held an exhibition for Holley school administration, board members and town officials in January to show off their skills. Holley student Dalton Major traveled to the NYS Fire Academy in 2014 to give a presentation on the group to the County Fire Coordinators' Association of the State of NY. After his presentation, he had a line of people waiting to talk with him to find out more about the program, which is the first of its kind to be sponsored by a school district.

Freida would like to see this group replicated with Monroe County fire departments and school districts. Emergency responders are in short supply all over the area and this is a way to get students interested in this field at a young age. "This program gives kids a chance to help in their communities," Freida said. "It also helps the fire departments and EMS stations fill a shortage in our field." He has had discussions with the Kendall Fire Department to see if Kendall can start a program in partnership with the Albion, Carlton and Barre Fire Departments.

History Students Visit St. John Fisher College

My U.S. History and Government classes took a trip on March 3 to St. John Fisher College. Students used the traveling exhibit “Lincoln: The Constitution and The Civil War” in addition to primary sources such as newspaper articles and political cartoons. They also viewed some short videos. Students played the role of members of the House of Representatives and investigated if Lincoln abused his powers as president when he suspended the right of habeas corpus, issued the Emancipation Proclamation, and allowed the use of African-Americans as soldiers in the war. I led the discussion as “Speaker of the House.” The St. John Fisher library staff assisted students in gathering and understanding the evidence.

National Junior Honor Society Induction Ceremony

The National Junior Honor Society (NJHS) Induction Ceremony occurred on March 18. Thirty-seven students in seventh through ninth grade were inducted based on their application to the faculty selection committee and maintenance of a 90 percent or higher academic average. The students must demonstrate the five qualities of NJHS membership: character, citizenship, leadership, scholarship and service.

The ceremony began with the current NJHS members leading a candlelight procession down the main aisles of the High School Auditorium. Current members tapped the shoulders of the new inductees sitting in the audience, who then exited the auditorium to receive boutonnieres. The new inductees then joined the 45 current NJHS members on the stage. The current NJHS officers lit the ceremonial candles and described each of the qualities of membership. The new members were sworn in as a group. When each inductee's name was announced, the student received their certificate from Principal Susan Cory and signed their name in the book that maintains a record of every NJHS inductee since 1989.

The guest speaker at the Induction Ceremony was Holley English Teacher Mark Thomas, who has taught classes

at Holley for the last 10 years. He talked about the qualities of membership in NJHS. Thomas urged the students to lead by both words and actions. He told the students that the definition of character is how you conduct yourself when no one is watching. "Service is applying knowledge," he said. "Service is a gift. What good is a gift if you don't share it?" He also spoke about the legacy they will leave behind when they graduate from Holley. "You will be remembered for what kind of character you possessed and how you treated people," Thomas said. "No one will remember the test scores or game scores. People will remember how you made them feel."

Cory echoed his sentiments when urging the audience of middle school students to consider applying for membership in NJHS or National Honor Society later on in high school. "You are the only one who can stop you from meeting the goal of being inducted," she said.

Business and Personal Law Class Takes Fieldtrip to Rochester

On Thursday, March 19, Jim Di Sessa’s Business and Personal Law class visited the Monroe County Court House in downtown Rochester. We watched misdemeanor arraignments and a murder trial. We discussed the possible appeal issues with our tour guide, Henry Jones, who is a law clerk. Our students identified two of the three issues that Jones discussed with them.

After the visit at the Court House, we went to McDonald’s for lunch. The owner, Louis Buono, and I attended high school together. Louis gave our students a tour of the back end of the restaurant and described how the business works from an employer and franchise owner’s perspective.

It is worth noting that Mandy McAvoy, the person that arranges the Court House tours, had children and a nephew that attended Holley. Mandy mentioned that all of her kids, as well as her nephew, loved Holley and thought it was a great school. Also, Hannah Page, one of the court officers, was a 2011 Holley graduate.

Students Receive Nutrition Lesson

During their physical education classes, Holley K-12 students participated in a lesson on nutrition led by Robert Batt from the Orleans County Cooperative Extension. He used a series of games to instruct students on reading food labels and using portion control. He had students try to figure out what one serving of food would look like by offering them plates of kale, bread, chips and cookies. Batt showed them a brief video presentation of what 200 calories of various foods look like. For example, 200 calories of celery is a full plate of celery versus 200 calories of a fast food hamburger is just a few bites. He also had the students figure out false food claims by having them compare newspaper headlines to pick out the true statements. One of the examples was "New Artificial Trans Fat Makes Bones Stronger" versus "Whole Grains Found to Make Kids Smarter, Stronger, Faster." Holley students must be eating their whole

grains because they were able to determine which one was the true statement.

Batt also had students figure out how much fat, sugar and sodium various foods contain and rank them from least to most in each nutrient. They learned that a fast food milkshake has the most of all three nutrients. He also had students pick the

healthiest option when presented with two products, like nuts versus whole-grain tortilla chips or all natural peanut butter versus regular peanut butter. He taught the students that there are two rules to follow: 1) read the label on food before eating it and 2) whichever food is closest to the farm version is the healthier choice. For example, an apple comes straight from the farm to market, but applesauce goes from the farm to a factory to be processed before going to market; therefore, the apple is the healthier choice.
