Superintendent's Message Common Core: Curriculum vs. Assessments

Dear Holley School Community,

Much has been written about the Common Core topic at both the local and national levels. At times, these articles do not distinguish between Common Core curriculum and assessments, which in my estimation, causes some confusion in the minds of parents and educators, as well. Good curriculum lends itself to good instruction and learning. If you recall your school days and the teachers you thought of as good teachers, chances are they delivered challenging, interesting and comprehensive lessons. It is no different in today's classroom. Good curriculum = Good instruction = Good learning.

For some parents, both locally and throughout the state, the true issue continues to be the assessments. Parents cite the age/grade level of test administration, the frequency of testing and whether the assessment is beneficial in truly analyzing and measuring student performance. As a result, many parents have refused their child's participation in the various assessments, and I respect a parent's right to make those decisions on behalf of their child. I also believe that regardless of how parents feel about the Common Core - both the curriculum and the assessments - school and home must continue to work together for the benefit of the child. With this in mind, the District will soon be offering a Parent Information Night to initiate awareness and discussion about Common Core. More detailed information will be forthcoming. Some of the topics that will be offered include:

- 1. The Common Core what is it from a curriculum as well as an assessment standpoint?
- 2. What is the school's role?
- 3. What is the parent's role? How can parents assist both the school and their child in this process?
- 4. How can school and home work closely together on this?
- 5. What is presently occurring in the schools to help better prepare students for not only Common Core, but all subjects and assessments?

There will also be time to answer some questions. I hope to see you at what promises to be a very interesting and informative event. As always, please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher or principal if you have any questions. We are prepared to assist and work with you for the benefit of your child.

The next phase of the project will involve replacing the rooftop HVAC units that have "aged out" and additional site work. The replacement and upgrading of equipment and machinery at Holley will enable the district to become more energy efficient and save money on utility costs. The Capital Project Phase III work is ongoing and projected to end during the 2016-17 school year.

Elementary Library Hosts Second Annual "Book Character" Pumpkin Decorating Contest

The Holley Elementary School Library is sponsoring a pumpkin decorating contest for Pre-K-grade 6 students. Contest runs from Oct. 5-23. Contest rules are:

- Entries must follow the theme of "My Favorite Book Character." Students may pick a character from any book they have read.
- Participation is voluntary. The entry should be done by the student with help from their families, if needed. Students must provide their own pumpkin and decorating materials. Classrooms may also choose to participate.
- **Pumpkins must not be carved.** Pumpkins can be painted or decorated, using acrylic paints, spray paint, permanent markers, yarn, construction paper, pipe cleaners, cloth, wigs, tape, paste, glue, etc. Carved pumpkins will not be accepted and will be returned to the submitter.
- One entry is allowed per student. A 3x5" index card must be submitted with the pumpkin, listing the student's name, grade and teacher's name on the back, and the name of the book character, book title and author on the front.
- Pumpkins must be brought to the Elementary Library on or before Oct. 23. No late entries will be accepted. All entries will be on display in the library.
- There will be a first, second and third place winner from each of these grade level categories: Pre-K through first grade, second through third grade and fourth through sixth grade. Prizes will also be awarded to classroom entries. All participants will be recognized. Winners will be announced on Oct. 30.
- All entries must be picked up from the library and taken home by Nov. 6. If any pumpkins remain after this date, they will be discarded.

RTI Changes at MS/HS

he Response to Interventions (RTI) teachers at Holley MS/HS have changed how they deliver strategies to students who need assistance with general academics, specific subject areas and/or general study skills. The RTI staff created dedicated classroom periods devoted to math and/or English where students are either assigned to the class every day or every other day, or they can drop-in to receive extra help in those subjects. Students are assigned to the RTI teachers based on test scores, teacher recommendation, or parent or student request. The students receive help with reading and writing for English class, mathematical concepts, general study and organizational skills, and learning strategies to improve their performance on tests and make them more successful in the classroom. All ELA teachers provide RTI support for English, all math teachers provide RTI support for math, Michelle Roman provides RTI support in all academic areas and teacher assistant Dawn Trask helps with RTI support in both English and math.

School Bus Safety Reminders

Did you know that an estimated 50,000 motor vehicles illegally pass New York State school buses every day? Don't become one of them! In New York State, it is illegal to pass a bus when its red lights are flashing. When drivers see the red lights flashing, they must come to a complete stop at least 20 feet away from the



bus so that the bus driver can pick up or discharge students. This rule applies even when a bus has its red lights flashing in a parking lot, on school grounds, on a multi-lane highway or on the opposite side of a divided highway. Drivers must stop, whether they are approaching the bus from the front or the rear. When the red lights stop flashing or when the bus driver signals, drivers may resume driving. Drivers must yield to flashing yellow lights on a bus, slow down and be prepared to stop.

Penalties for passing a school bus involve fines, points added to your license and possible jail time. Refer to the table below.

By Conviction	Minimum Fine	Maximum Fine	Possible Imprisonment
First conviction	\$250	\$400	Up to 30 days
Second conviction (within 3 years)	\$600	\$750	Up to 180 days
Third or subsequent conviction (within 3 years)	\$750	\$1,000	Up to 180 days

COUNSELING News

The **PSAT (Practice SAT—College Entrance Exam)** will be given at the Holley MS/HS on Wednesday, Oct. 14 from 7:45 a.m.-noon. All college-bound sophomores and juniors are encouraged to take this exam. Students must register in the High School Counseling Office with Andrew Ruff. The cost of the exam is \$15 and may be paid by cash or check made payable to Holley Central School.

Seniors should have toured colleges over the summer break. They should now be narrowing their search. They should register to take the **SAT and/or ACT** sometime in the fall. Online registration is available for the SAT at www. collegeboard.com and for the ACT at www.actstudent.org. Seniors should be working on their college applications, with the goal of completing them by Thanksgiving. Some colleges have different deadlines, so be sure to check the application deadline of the particular college you are applying to.

Senior interviews have begun in September. The purpose of the senior interview is to review high school graduation requirements and credits, confirm the student took or is taking the classes needed to graduate, and discuss post-graduation plans, such as college, military or employment. 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The Biggest Winner Contest

Chris Callahan was declared the "Biggest Winner" in Holley's Biggest Winner Contest that ended in June 2015. Callahan, a Holley parent and grandparent, who works as a development aide at a group home, lost 21.86 percent of her body weight in eight months, but gained a new 32-inch Samsung TV for her efforts. Total weight loss for the 67 participants was 185.4 pounds.

This is the third time the Holley Central School District hosted the Biggest Winner weight loss challenge, which was open to residents of the community and district employees. Participants met monthly in the elementary school fitness



room to weigh in. Each monthly meeting had a different focus and they included a fitness challenge, preparation of healthy smoothies, an activity night with S & S Fitness and Martial Arts Center, and educational seminars with Orleans County Cooperative Extension and Orleans County Mental Health Department to discuss food labels and portions. During these sessions, prizes were raffled off from local businesses, with grand prizes handed out in June. The top five grand prize winners are listed below:

In the past three years, 152 participants have lost a grand total of 901 pounds in the Biggest Winner Contest.

Callahan was very surprised to win the contest because she initially joined to get ideas from other people on how to stay on track with her nutrition and exercise goals. She said the biggest change she had to make was to eat more regularly. She used to eat only once or twice a day, which lead to overeating and an underactive metabolism, but now she eats every two to three hours and has protein with every meal. Callahan belongs to a gym and walks every day on her lunch break at work. She enjoyed the monthly meetings. "My favorite night was the shopping night where we had to put together a healthy meal for less than \$10," said Callahan.

PEP UPDATE

Te are working towards completion of the goals and objectives for year two of our Carol M. White Physical Education Program (PEP) grant. Our students continue to take pre- and post-tests on nutrition, along with fruit and vegetable surveys. We monitor student activity levels through our movable bands, which keep track of the steps students take over a fouror seven-day time frame. New color bands will be offered this year. We also offer our students FIT4U! afterschool activities to help them stay active. Each session has a nutrition/fitness lesson. Our students are becoming much more knowledgeable about how to eat right and exercise to stay fit thanks to our PEP grant funding!

Our PE staff will provide Fitnessgram testing in the fall and spring to monitor fitness levels. Last spring, we had a 25 percent increase in K-12 student scores, which was a fine accomplishment. This helped us receive the continuance award. This past summer, our physical education (PE) staff infused nutrition and fitness into all PE units in their curriculum. We also had campus maps created by the Rochester Orienteering Club and our staff will be trained so we can introduce our students to this new unit.

We will continue working with our PEP grant partners this year: the Orleans County Cooperative Extension, Orleans County Mental Health, recreation department and our Food Service department. We continue to promote the fruit and vegetable of the month program with our Food Service Director Vickie Scroger. In addition, special training, educational lessons and programs will be provided to our staff and students in conjunction with our partners.

The Biggest Winner Contest will offer our community educational seminars and activities on the second Tuesday of each month starting in November. You do not have to be a member of the contest to attend these activities. With the PEP grant, we have been able to purchase state-ofthe-art fitness room equipment to provide everyone in our community a place to stay fit and active.
