## HOMECOMING WEEK


## Superintendent's Message

Dear Parents and Community Members,

I recently received information from William Hochul, U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Western New York, about the serious matter of middle and high school students continuing to use prescription drugs without the approval of a doctor. Hochul also provided information on the dangers of heroin use, especially when it's mixed with fentanyl. According to recently published data, student use of drugs overall in grades 8-12 has decreased. The proportion of 12th graders misusing prescription drugs has also declined from 17.1 percent in 2005 to 13.9 percent in 2014. Regrettably, some 12th graders have exchanged prescription pills for heroin.

Heroin on its own is highly addictive and potentially deadly. When mixed with fentanyl, the consequences can be much more severe. In addition to prescription drugs, marijuana, heroin and fentanyl, we must continue to monitor the dangers of "synthetic" drugs. - Has cuts, bruises or scratches
- Has few, if any friends
- Seems afraid to go to school, complains
- Has nondescript illnesses
- Has trouble sleeping
- Loses interest in schoolwork
- Seems sad or depressed, moody
- Is anxious
- Has poor self-esteem
- Is quiet, sensitive or passive.

### Your child may be bullying others if he/she:

- Teases, threatens or is physical with others
- Is hot-tempered or impulsive
- Has a hard time following rules
- Is aggressive toward adults
- Lacks sympathy for others
- Has been involved in antisocial behaviors, such as theft or vandalism
- Is quick to blame others.

## FIRE PREVENTION AT HOLLEY ELEMENTARY



The Holley Fire Department demonstrated to the Pre-K-3 students at Holley Elementary School what to do in case of a fire. The students practiced stop, drop and roll; went through a simulated fire in a safety house; watched a fireman put on his protective gear; and learned about the different tools on the fire trucks. The firefighters didn't want the children to be afraid of them in their full gear so they demonstrated what it sounds like talking through a mask and how hard it is to hear with the head gear on.

Students from Holley Middle School/High School also participated in the fire prevention activities. Students in grades 6-12 are eligible to belong to the Youth Fire Group and they work with the Clarendon, Holley and Fancher Hulberton Murray (FHM) Fire Departments. Currently, about 14 students in grades 7-12 belong to the group and several have joined the Clarendon and Holley Fire Departments. The students meet every other Monday at the Clarendon Fire Department and receive the same training, with some restrictions, as adult firefighters. They use turn-out gear donated by other fire departments. "There aren't many youth groups like this across the country, but this group has been at Holley for three years," said Clarendon Fire Chief Bob Freida.
