#### **Upcoming Grades 3-8 Assessments**

Dear Holley Central Community,

The second semester of each school year is always challenging as there is so much to accomplish during those 20 weeks of school. It is also an exciting time with all of the student-centered activities such as the prom, sixth grade moving up ceremonies, musicals, athletics and awards programs. The grades 3-8 assessments in math and ELA are also scheduled during this semester. Our new Commissioner of Education, Mary Ellen Elia, is working with the Board of Regents and educators from throughout the state to maximize the benefits of teaching and learning in New York State. The Commissioner has determined that students and teachers would be "held harmless" from the results of state assessments until 2020. The teacher/principal evaluation process will have a four-year transition period while changes that will impact the assessments directly will include: modifying the standards, shortening state exams and collaboration among all stakeholders, including teachers, parents and support staff.

Our principals, teachers and staff are working very hard each and every day to provide the very best in classroom instruction for your child. I am very proud of the hard work and dedication that takes place each day in our classrooms. I am pleased to observe first-hand the good things that are happening in Holley schools. We will continue to partner with you so that we can assist every student in fulfilling his/her potential. #### PRE-K AND KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

olley Pre-K and Kindergarten Registration will be held on March 16 from 1-5 p.m. **only**. Registration will take place in the Elementary Library Classroom.

To be eligible for Pre-K registration, a child must be four years old by December 1, 2016. No Pre-K registration will be allowed before March 16.

To be eligible for Kindergarten registration, a child must be five years old by December 1, 2016.

In order to register your child, you must bring your child's birth certificate, immunization record and proof of residency (utility bill, tax bill, etc.). You will **not** be able to register your child without these documents.

Pre-K and Kindergarten medical physicals are required to be completed by September 1, 2016.

### COUNSELING News

#### **High School Seniors**

If you plan to attend college after graduation, you must fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible. Visit www.fafsa.ed.gov to complete your form online. The FAFSA is the source of all federal and state aid, loans and work-study programs. The form must be filled out online and submitted to the colleges by their due dates in order to be eligible for these programs. If you are planning on attending a community college after graduation, hopefully, you have already applied. Once the deposit has been made, students can take placement tests and register for classes. The earlier, the better!

#### Attention Juniors - Sign up for SAT and/or ACT

Juniors who are considering college after graduation should plan to take the SAT and/or ACT in May or June. Students can register online at www.collegeboard.com for the SAT and at www.actstudent.org for the ACT. Students currently receiving free or reduced price lunches should see their counselor for a fee waiver; act quickly, because the number of fee waivers is limited.

#### **College and Career Readiness Night** (formerly known as CAIN)

The College and Career Readiness Night will be held on Thursday, April 14 at 6 p.m. at Brockport High School. College representatives from the following SUNY colleges will be there: Alfred State College, The College at Brockport, Finger Lakes Community College, Genesee Community College and Monroe Community College. Area college representatives will also be present from: **Rochester Institute of Technology**, **St.** 

**John Fisher College** and the **University of Rochester**. There will also be community/industry representatives from the Electrical Union, Wegmans, Carpenter's Union, SPX, Earth Link and Unity Health. Parents and students will learn the training and education needed to navigate the planning process, and academic requirements for employability in the field. Combined efforts between a college professor, representative in the field and middle skills specialist will answer questions and give information on specific trends in the area of employment. This is a great opportunity for both parents and students to research jobs and career choices. You don't want to miss out! This event is open to any student in grades 8-12!

That same day, the FIT4U! cooking and nutrition class helped prepare a footballthemed lunch for the elementary school in honor of the Super Bowl. The class learned healthier ways to make different foods for lunch. The students decided to plan a Super Bowl party. They found recipes to make food with low-fat or fatfree ingredients. They also tried to think of ways to incorporate more fruits and vegetables into their menu.

The menu included spinach dip served with whole grain pita bread slices and flatbread pizza topped with fresh vegetables such as spinach, peppers, onion, tomato and black olives. For dessert, the students mixed low-fat vanilla yogurt, light Cool Whip, and chopped strawberries and pineapple, and froze the mixture between two graham crackers. The FIT4U! class also made decorations to decorate the cafeteria. # **Holley Wrestling Coach John Grillo**

#### Achieves 700th Win

Tan. 20 became a record-breaking night for Holley Varsity Wrestling Coach John Grillo. It marked the night of his 700th win as a wrestling coach. Holley defeated tough competitor Lyndonville 54-35 in the Genesee Region match hosted at Lyndonville High School. Grillo's wins have spanned more than 40 years, with 30 of them at Holley Central School District (HCSD) and 12 of them at Pavilion Central School District. He now holds the record for the most wins in New York State.

Grillo has been a grade K-12 physical education teacher at HCSD since 1989. He has been a wrestling coach for his entire teaching career. Grillo also runs the Hawk Junior Wrestling Club at Holley Middle School/High School and the Holley Hawk Youth Club at Holley Elementary School. His Holley Hawk wrestlers have won 20 Genesee Region League titles and 11 Section V Championships. While coaching at Pavilion, one of his wrestlers also earned a Sectional Title. Grillo was named Genesee Region Coach of the Year 15 times and Section V Coach of the Year six times.

Grillo has maintained an enthusiasm for the sport and his players through all of his coaching seasons. Even though retirement is not as far off as it once was, he is passionate about continuing to coach and teach at HCSD. In addition to coaching hundreds of students, Grillo coached his three sons to wrestling victories. The oldest, Ashley John Grillo, was a state representative and placed fifth at the NYSPHSAA State Tournament. The second oldest, Adam Grillo, was a fivetime USA Wrestling All American. The youngest, Andrew Grillo, was also a state representative and the first-ever NYSPHSAA State Champion from Holley, as well as a USA Wrestling All American. All three brothers were multiple Section V Class Champions and National Academic All Americans in high school and competed in collegiate wrestling. Ashley, Adam and Andrew assist John in coaching the Holley wrestling teams. Ashley and Andrew both work at HCSD; Ashley as the Holley Elementary assistant vice principal and Andrew as a grade K-12 physical education teacher.

### Wrestling Youth Club Begins Feb. 22

The Wrestling Youth Club will begin on Feb. 22 at Holley Elementary School for students in **grades K-8**. Registration will be held on Feb. 22 from 5:45-6 p.m. in the Intermediate Gym, with practice following. All parents must attend registration to complete paperwork. There is no registration fee. Practice will run from 6-7:15 p.m. on Mondays and Tuesdays until March 22. Basic wrestling techniques are taught by the High School Wrestling Coaching staff, Holley Club Coaches

and members of the high school wrestling team. Wrestling drills, intra-contests and physical fitness are part of the Club, too. Students will learn sportsmanship and have fun through participation in this Club.

The Club will continue through May 31 on Monday and Tuesday evenings from 6-7:15 p.m. for students in grades **7-12**. Some youth wrestlers may also be asked by the coaching staff to attend these sessions.

### **New Vaccine** Requirement for Sept. 2016

n Oct. 26, 2015, New York State Public Health Law was amended to require children entering or attending seventh and 12th grades on or after Sept. 1, 2016 to receive an adequate dose or doses of vaccine against meningococcal disease as recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP).

Meningococcal meningitis is a serious disease which can lead to death within hours. Survivors may be left with severe disabilities, including the loss of limbs, cognitive deficits, paralysis, deafness or seizures.

The ACIP recommendations for meningococcal vaccine are:

- A single dose of vaccine against meningococcal serogroups A, C, W-135 and Y should be administered to all adolescents at age 11 or 12 years.
- A second (booster) dose of the vaccine should be administered at age 16 years.
  - o The booster dose is not necessary for adolescents who receive the first dose at 16 years of age or older.
  - o The minimum interval between doses is eight weeks.
- A serogroup B meningococcal vaccine series may be administered to adolescents and young adults 16-23 years of age, at the discretion of the healthcare provider. The preferred age for MenB vaccine is 16-18 years of age.

### **Holley First and Second Graders Learn About Healthy Choices**

In December, Karen Blank, from The Whole Approach Studio, led Holley Elementary students in first and second grades through a workshop entitled "Healthy Snack Cooking & Games." She met with 24 students after school twice a week and taught them about nutrition, games to stay active, how to make their own healthy snacks and how to make healthy living choices. The students were joined by their parents for the final workshop on the evening of Dec. 17, where they set the table together and prepared a healthy dinner of homemade ravioli and salad.

Blank's workshops were offered free to Holley Central School District (HCSD) students as part of the three-year Carol M. White Physical Education Program (PEP) grant the district received last year. HCSD regularly offers before and after school programs to grades K-12 students as part of its FIT4U! program, made possible by the PEP grant. The FIT4U! program focuses on teaching students about fitness and nutrition through a variety of activities and educational programs.

Students took pre- and post-tests evaluating how much they knew about healthy choices at the start and conclusion of the workshop. Their knowledge of healthy behaviors increased from 61 percent to 99 percent.

### **Humanities Class Explores the Future**

The Holley High School Humanities Class presented innovations to a community board made up of Holley faculty, staff, administration and a board member on Jan. 22. Each student gave a PowerPoint presentation on his/her idea, which ranged from obtaining the perfect manicure at home to creating a turbo charger for cars to use fuel more efficiently. Students researched how their innovations could be marketed and priced, what materials would be required for development, the effect their innovations would have on the job market, and what changes would need to take place in the environment, government or social systems to make their innovations a reality. In one student's case, he wanted to make everyone's living environment a virtual reality; for example, he proposed owning a virtual pet without having all the responsibilities that pet ownership entails (food, exercise, training, medical care, etc.).

Many ideas seemed possible to implement in the near future. For example, the idea to string lights above parking spaces that would be activated by a weight and motion sensor to indicate through a color system which spaces were occupied, available or had cars exiting might be adopted by a local mall during the holiday season. The idea to run a bakery that incorporates medical marijuana into baked goods for those who have a prescription for it might not be too far off, in light of Rochester opening its first medical marijuana clinic recently.

Some ideas were more ambitious and would take longer to implement, such as building an international space station for anyone to learn about space and devising a filtration device to remove greenhouse gases from the environment. Other ideas fell in the middle, with the idea to offer mental health services to convicted prisoners while they are serving their sentences requiring a lot of political and social



change, and developing the right product to harness solar power to charge your cell phone while you held it requiring scientific experimentation. Some ideas are already in use, such as using a phone app to wirelessly charge your devices or inserting a noise blocker in your ear to avoid unwanted noises, but they just require fine-tuning through the use of new technology to achieve students' desired results.

The Humanities class created the "Innovation Forum" to mark the end of the first semester for this new course offered jointly by the Social Studies and English departments at Holley. Teachers Mike Crissman and Suzanne Lepkowski taught the class of 14 students. They broke the semester into three segments, with students examining the past, present and future of how the human race and social culture have evolved. A Humanities II class is offered in the second semester, with about 12 students enrolled. "The students have really shaped the class and what we cover each semester," said Lepkowski. "We have had some great discussions in class and we've investigated subjects that the students wanted to learn more about. The class has formed their own culture and they are very protective and supportive of each other, which is nice to see." The class also incorporated a community service event into the first semester. In December, they hosted a holiday photo session, where the class took holiday photos of local families and offered refreshments. They accepted donations of new toys for the Gary the Happy Pirate Toy Fund and non-perishable food items and cash donations for the community center. The students have started discussing what they would like to offer the community in the second semester.

# **Three Holley Students Have** Award-Winning Handwriting

English teachers Suzanne Lepkowski and Julie Wantuck encouraged their ninth and 10th grade students to enter the second annual Clarkson Historical Society Handwriting Contest.
