Holley Team Takes Top Honors at Tech Wars

Superintendent's Message

WHY IS ASSESSMENT IMPORTANT?

Dear Parents and Community Members,

The administration of the NYS assessments in math and ELA are now completed. Once again, there has been a great deal of debate regarding the value of these assessments. Personally, I respect a parent's right to make decisions concerning what they believe to be in the best interest of their children. So, I am not debating the opt-out issue as, for me, it is a subjective topic. However, as a life-long educator, I place great value on assessment, if done correctly. Assessment is instruction. I recently read an article in Edutopia (www.edutopia.org), which is a part of the George Lucas Educational Foundation. The theme of the article stresses that when assessment works best, it should produce the following (the subjectivity enters into it as to your beliefs about assessments, but I ask you to consider these points):

WHEN ASSESSMENT WORKS BEST, IT DOES THE FOLLOWING:

PROVIDES DIAGNOSTIC FEEDBACK

- What is the student's knowledge
- What is the student's performance
- What are the student's needs?
- What has to be taught?

HELPS EDUCATORS SET STANDARDS

- What performance demonstrates understanding?
- What performance demonstrates knowledge?
- What performance demonstrates mastery?

- How is the student doing?
- · What teaching methods or approaches are most effective?
- What changes or modifications to a lesson are needed to help the student?

RELATES TO A STUDENT'S PROGRESS

- What has the student learned?
- Can the student talk about the new knowledge?
- Can the student demonstrate and use the new skills in other projects/ lessons?

MOTIVATES PERFORMANCE FOR STUDENT SELF-EVALUATION

- Now that I am in charge of my learning, how am I doing?
- Now that I know how I am doing, how can I do better?
- What else would I like to learn?

FOR TEACHER SELF-EVALUATION

- What is working for the students?
- What can I do to help the students
- In what direction should we go

These are all excellent points to think about and they help to generate good discussions during each building's School Improvement Team (SIT) meetings and beyond. As I stated above, it is your right to make decisions that you feel are in the best interest of your children. However, if we can arrive at a point where assessments can satisfy the statements above, the time spent in doing so will result in our Holley students truly maximizing their abilities and potentials. Prince Eric's companion Grimsby (William Harrington) and Chef Louis (Matthew DeSimone) provide some comic relief during events on land, while Ariel's sisters Aquata (Alice McAllister), Andrina (Sienna Steier), Arista (Lexianne

Seewagen), Atina (Megan Fribance), Adella (Hannah Bailey) and Allana (Allyson Skehan) fail to understand her longing to be human.

The student actors did a fine job of playing their roles as the much-loved characters from this Disney classic, adding the appropriate level of wonder, humor, longing and evilness to the story. Blackburn is currently being recruited by eight colleges to play basketball for her next two years of college. "I can attest to her determination, character, tireless work ethic, self-motivation, high moral standards, the high expectations she holds for herself and her ability to be coachable," said her former Holley Basketball Coach Mark Thomas. "She

National Junior Honor Society Induction Ceremony

"Finish everything you do to the best of your ability, and it will pay off. The result may not always be what you want, but you will establish an undying work ethic that you will carry with you all your life." Towards the end of the speech, D'Amuro began to recite a quote that is in his classroom, and the students finished it for him: "Nothing worthwhile in life is given to you – it's earned." His speech ended with a request to the students to not lose their sense of humor, treat others with respect and be a lifelong learner.

Cory echoed his message in her closing remarks to students and their parents. "I loved the message Mr. D'Amuro gave you," she said. "We all need to work hard for what we want. If we do not try, we will never get there. In life, things are not handed to you."
