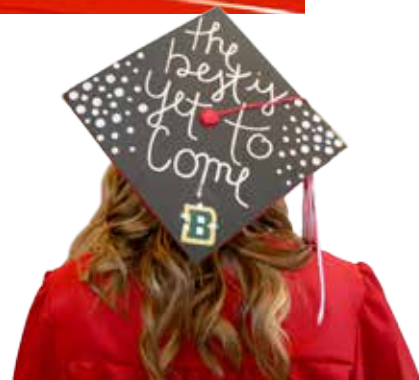

Congratulations to Holley's Graduating Class of 2016



Eighty-four seniors graduated from Holley Middle School/High School (MS/HS) on June 25. The boys wore black caps and gowns and the girls wore red as they filed onto the field in the Holley Hawks Stadium. Sixty-one graduates will head off to college and vocational school, one will obtain vocational training, 12 will join the workforce, six will join the military, three are undecided and another will return to his home country of Argentina. Graduates received \$19,000 in local and community scholarships and awards, and \$400,000 in specific college scholarships.

Class of 2016 President Xander Apicella started the ceremony and Vice President Brady Smith presented the high school with a monetary donation to Unified Sports as their class gift. Salutatorian Apicella and Valedictorian Smith gave their speeches to an audience that filled the bleachers and grounds surrounding the stadium. Graduates

were acknowledged with awards from Senior Class Advisor Suzanne Lepkowski. John Grillo, Holley MS/HS Physical Education Teacher and Coach, gave the commencement address. He told the class to be on the attack and move forward to prepare for their career. "Being a Holley Hawk has given you the wings to fly," said Grillo. He received a standing ovation.

After Holley staff announced the graduates' names and future plans, Board of Education President Brenda Swanger posed with the graduates while giving them their diplomas. Superintendent Robert D'Angelo and Principal Susan Cory, along with the rest of the Board of Education members, offered handshakes to the graduates on their way back to their seats on the field. Graduates adjourned to the corner of the field by the scoreboard for the traditional cap toss photo.



Holley Student Surprised with Special Honors at School Assembly

Monday, May 23, started out as a normal day of school for 18-year-old Nick Pifer, but it would end in a remarkable way. Nick, a special needs student, graduated from Holley last year, but he remains in the Service Learning Program at Holley so he can receive job training. He cheerfully works in the MS/HS Dining Hall making sandwiches, and he was a player on the district's Unified Basketball team this year. He has also befriended Officer Shawn O'Mara, a police officer from the Gates Police Department, who works part-time for the Holley School District as a C.O.P.S. security officer. Nick is fascinated by law enforcement and constantly talks to Officer O'Mara about his job.

"We don't talk about sports or anything else," said Officer O'Mara. "We just talk about police work. We watch police takedown videos in the security office and Nick loves it. At one point, he asked to see my badge and ID to confirm my identity. Nick always has a smile on his face and it's just contagious. I can come in from having a tough day, but he instantly cheers me up. He's been asking if he could do a ride along all year and I told him we'd see."

Nick was part of the crowd of students who filed into the High School Auditorium for a surprise assembly on May 23. There was a lineup of law enforcement officials on the stage, many of them Holley alumni. Officer O'Mara

called Nick up to the stage and Nick calmly sat down at the end of the row of law enforcement officers like he was already part of their community. Nick was called over to the podium by Officer O'Mara and told that he would finally have his wish granted: Nick would be sworn in as an honorary police officer for the day and ride along with Officer O'Mara in a Gates Police Department vehicle. Nick would even receive an official uniform, complete with his name, "Officer Nick," embroidered on the shirt, and wear a hat and badge. The students erupted in applause and cheers for Nick when he reappeared on stage in the uniform and tipped his hat to the audience. Nick was then sworn in by Gates Town Supervisor Mark Assini while Gates Police Chief James VanBrederode held the Bible. Once Nick was sworn in, students, faculty and staff gave him a standing ovation.

After posing for some photos onstage and being interviewed by the media, Nick happily waved from the front seat of Officer O'Mara's police car as they hit the siren and left the Holley school campus. Nick spent the day with Officer O'Mara answering calls; making stops in Gates; and most importantly, visiting Dunkin' Donuts to eat as many free donuts as he wanted.

Biggest Winner Contest Declares Winner

Pam Coopenberg was declared the "Biggest Winner" in Holley's Biggest Winner Contest that ended on June 7. Coopenberg, a Holley cafeteria staff member, lost 12 percent of her body weight since the contest started in November 2015, but gained a new 32-inch Samsung TV for her efforts. Total weight loss for the 51 participants was 239.9 pounds.

This is the fourth time the Holley Central School District has hosted the Biggest Winner weight loss challenge, which was open to residents of the community and district employees. Participants met monthly in the elementary school cafeteria to weigh in. Each monthly meeting had a different focus and they included a fitness demonstration by Agapé, activity nights with S & S Fitness and Martial Arts Center, and nutrition seminars with Orleans County Cooperative Extension. During these sessions, prizes were raffled off from local businesses, with grand prizes handed out in June. To be eligible for the grand prizes, participants must have missed no more than two meetings and had the greatest percentage of weight lost. The top seven grand prize winners are listed below:

In the past four years, 203 participants have lost a grand total of 1,140.9 pounds in the Biggest Winner Contest.

Coopenberg's motivation to participate in the contest was a diabetes diagnosis. She made diet changes this year, including cutting down on carbohydrates and sugar, and started exercising more by walking and coaching basketball. She would encourage others to join the program next fall. "It's worth it, we had a good time," said Coopenberg. "I looked forward to the meetings every month."

Holley Budget Passes and Two Board Members are Elected

On May 17, Holley voters passed the budget with 373 yes votes and 207 no votes. Both propositions passed - one for the purchase of buses with 368 yes votes and 213 no votes, and the other to support the Community Free Library with 418 yes votes and 166 no votes.

Holley voters also elected two members to the Board of Education, each with three-year terms: John Heise (370 votes) and Brenda Swanger (423 votes).

The District congratulates the members of the board on their election and thanks voters for supporting our budget and propositions.

Holley Wins a Continuance Award of PEP Grant

Holley recently received a continuance award for the third year of the Carol M. White Physical Education Program (PEP) grant in the amount of \$128,612. Over the past three years, Holley has been awarded a grand total of \$781,643 for health and physical education (PE) programs. Due to this grant, Holley has obtained state-of-the-art fitness room equipment for both the Middle School/High School (MS/HS) and Elementary School Fitness Rooms. PE staff has purchased a variety of supplies and equipment for their programs, too. Chefs have been able to work with our cafeteria staff and a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist (RDN) has provided feedback on school meals. We've been able to offer yearlong before and after school FIT4U! programs at no cost to our families.

All training for our PE and health staff is completely funded through this grant. Our PE staff infuses nutrition and fitness into their curriculum. Some of the new activities our students will see in the upcoming school year include inline skating, orienteering and mapping skills, First Tee golf program and DrumFIT. PEP Project Director Lisa Campbell stated, "PE staff has worked tremendously hard to provide the data that the federal government requires in order to be awarded a continuance each year. This data comes from having our students wear the movable bands to track their physical activity, providing surveys, and administering pre- and post-tests pertaining to nutrition and health. It is a ton of extra time and work, but I commend and thank the PE staff for their fine efforts that have enabled us to win the continuance award each year!"

Holley Staff Receives Food Tips from Chef

Students in the FIT4U! Cooking Class, led by Food Service Director Vickie Scroger, gave their fellow classmates a chance to sample the food they made during lunch periods on May 13. Parker Walker, Sebastian Bartholomew, Arianna Ratchford, Hailey Rowley and Johnathon Schultz each prepared a recipe for students to try. There was a strawberry-banana smoothie made with pineapple and oats, a gluten-free chocolate chip cookie bar, chocolate zucchini cake, kale chips and veggie pizzas on pitas for students to enjoy free samples of during their lunch periods. Hailey, a junior, said the class was small, but she'd participate again. "I loved learning to cook these recipes and trying different foods," she said. Participants decided what recipes they wanted to make and they sampled each other's recipes. They all went home with copies of the recipes so they can make them on their own. Most students surveyed during fifth period lunch preferred the gluten-free chocolate chip cookie bars, not realizing that they were even gluten-free. The zucchini cake and smoothie were other favorites cited by students.

The cooking class was made possible by the Carol M. White PEP grant that Holley has participated in since 2014. Physical Education Teacher John Grillo, who coordinates FIT4U! classes at the MS/HS, fully supported the program after sampling the recipes. "If we educated five kids through this class, that's the point," Grillo said. "If they tell their friends about the class or share the recipe with them, then we've impacted some more students and taught them how to eat healthy. Vickie did a great job with the class and went above and beyond like she always does with her food."

PRE-K REGISTRATION

Holley Students Witness the Results of Unwise Decisions

On June 3, Holley seniors attended an assembly and mock accident scene to understand the results of driving while under the influence of alcohol. After watching a video of a party that their classmates attended, students transferred to the parking lot, where two vehicles had collided. One student had crashed through the windshield of one vehicle and the remaining students were trapped and appeared unresponsive in both vehicles. Students portraying the victims of the accident were made up to look like they were injured. The Holley police, ambulance and fire departments responded, along with a helicopter from Mercy Flight. The emergency responders enacted what they would do at the scene of a two-car motor vehicle crash with injuries and a fatality. The fire department worked to free the victims from the vehicles by removing doors on both vehicles and the roof of one of the vehicles. The driver of one car was questioned by police and went through a sobriety field test before he was handcuffed and placed in the back of a police car. Several students



were evaluated by ambulance personnel while one was loaded onto a stretcher and placed in an ambulance. Another student was extracted from her vehicle and loaded onto the Mercy Flight helicopter. A hearse from Christopher Mitchell Funeral Home was also onsite to transport the "dead" body. The coroner had the deceased's mother identify him before he was zipped into the body bag.

Holley Police Chief Roland Nenni talked to the students about making bad decisions, whether it was texting while driving, drinking or taking drugs and then driving, driving while drowsy, or not buckling their seatbelt. He

encouraged students to call someone for a ride rather than make a risky decision. Principal Susan Cory told students it took 20 minutes to extract the student who had to be loaded onto the helicopter; the student told her it felt like it took much longer. "Studies have shown that watching an assembly like this only affects students for 24-48 hours after the event," said Cory. "Since tonight is your prom, I want you to use your heads and make smart decisions. I want to see you at graduation. This is the time of year where we hear about accidents daily and I don't want to hear that one of you was involved."



The NED Show visits Holley Elementary in May

Holley elementary students met NED during The NED Show, a character education assembly on May 25. NED is a cardboard cutout of a boy who is the focus of the assembly, along with his human co-star, Channing. Channing carried on a conversation with NED while she performed yo-yo tricks and told the students a story, complete with sound effects. She talked to the students about being a champion in life and at school by doing the right thing, having a good attitude and setting goals. She explained that NED stands for:

- Never give up
- Encourage others
- Do your best

Channing encouraged audience participation by asking the students questions. She shared that champions love to help people. Together, they coined the phrase "championocity" (act like a champion and encourage others to do it,

too) which she encouraged the students to do, following the NED principles. She told students it's okay to make mistakes because they can learn from them and it shows that they are trying. Channing instructed students to apologize when they've done something wrong. She encouraged students to start small by working on one task, whether it be learning to yo-yo or working on their spelling, then move on to bigger goals once they've mastered the smaller ones.

After the assembly, students received order sheets to purchase NED gear. By buying these products, they help pay it forward so that the same assembly can be held at another school, at no cost to that school. Teachers receive free resources from The NED Show that they can use in their classrooms to improve student behavior and increase the focus on instruction time.



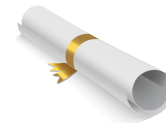

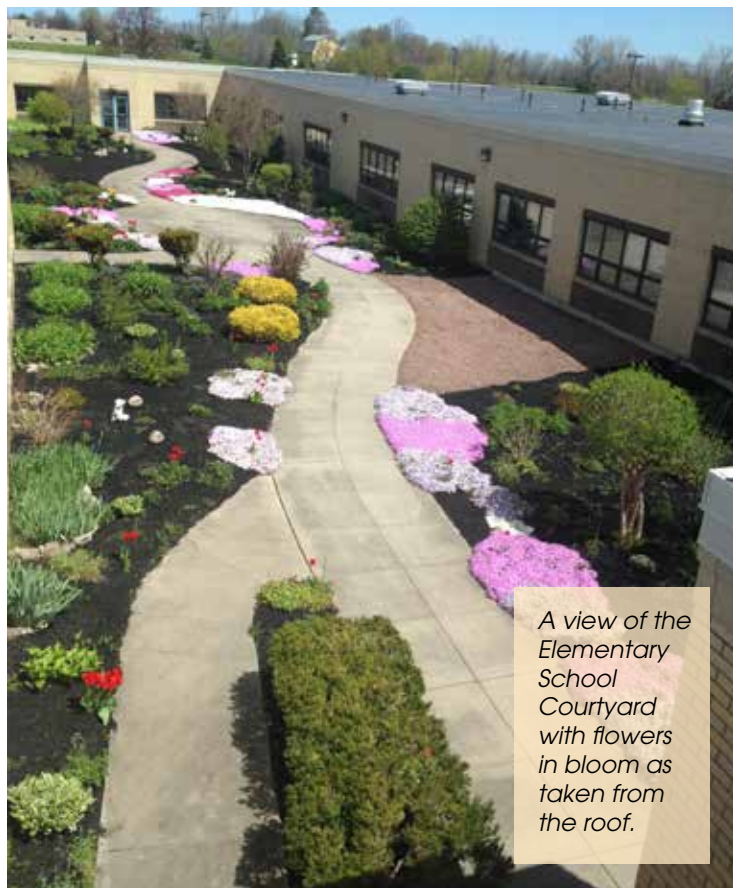
