Superintendent's Message:

RUDE vs. MEAN vs. BULLYING: WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

Dear Holley Community,

In the recent past, I have met with both parents and students about situations that they have described as bullying. In some instances, what they have described would lead one to believe that indeed bullying has occurred. In other instances, what may have been thought of as bullying may very well be a matter of rudeness or being mean. So what's the difference?

Rudeness - inadvertently saying or doing something that hurts someone else. As far as kids are concerned, rudeness may look more like jumping ahead in line or bragging about achieving the highest grade. Any of these actions could be looked upon as bullying, but when looked at in greater context, incidents of rudeness are spontaneous, unplanned and inconsiderate; based more on poor manners; and not meant to hurt someone.

Mean - purposefully saying or doing something to hurt someone once or maybe twice. The main distinction between "rude" and "mean" behavior has much to do with intention. While rudeness is often unintentional, mean

behavior very much aims to hurt someone. Examples include criticizing clothing, appearance or intelligence. Mean behavior is often motivated by angry feelings and may wound someone deeply. Yet, meanness is different from bullying.


Bullying - intentionally aggressive behavior, repeated over time, that involves an imbalance of power. Three key elements - intent to harm, power imbalance, and repeated acts or threats of aggressive behavior - are present in the case of bullying.

First of all, it is important to distinguish between rude, mean and bullying acts so that everyone involved knows what to pay attention to and when/how to intervene.

Whether it is rudeness, meanness or bullying, there is no place for any of that in our schools. The solution to all of this, in part, lies in the fact that all stakeholders - school personnel, students and parents - must work in collaboration to put an end to unjust treatment of any individual in our schools. Without the assistance of students and parents, the Principal and Assistant Principal will never be able to prevent or restrict the number

of rude, mean or bullying incidents in the schools. We must create a culture in both of our buildings that is arrived at collaboratively, one that has as its core value that we will not tolerate any form of mistreatment of another person. Building on that, schools can then create programs, messages in the buildings, and activities that promote mutual respect and cooperation among all stakeholders. Then, and only then, will we be able to minimize the rude, mean and bullying behaviors. And lastly, in the event that there are those individuals who choose not to adhere to our core value, regardless of how hard we try, there must be immediate and appropriate consequences to ensure that our buildings remain places of learning that are safe and positive.

We have a great school district, and we all need to work together to make it better and better each day. I know we can do it with everyone's help. Thank you.



Holley Students Stage Presidential Debates

The Holley Current Events class held a series of three mock presidential debates this fall. Students were assigned the roles of presidential candidates, presidential advisors or moderators. Students Kayla Thrower (as Democrat Hillary Clinton), Glenn Thrower (as Republican Donald Trump) and Alex Mounts (as Libertarian Gary Johnson) worked with their advisors to prepare for each debate. The students prepared for five weeks to impersonate the candidates, adopting much of their personas and mannerisms. They debated issues such as immigration, terrorism, war, gun laws, health care, free trade, jobs and taxes.

MS/HS students, staff and faculty were invited to attend the debates at the end of the day on Oct. 25 and 26 in the MS/HS Auditorium. The audience completed ballots to determine the winner of each debate. A panel of six teachers and three moderators also completed ballots after each debate. On Nov. 1, the public was invited to attend the final debate. Twenty-five people made up the panel that evening and 378 votes were cast. The entire Current Events class conducted a Q&A session with the audience at the end of the final debate.

Debate moderators were senior McKenzie Hendrickson and juniors Jessica Sedore and Hanna Waterman; these students kept the candidates on task while Current Events Teacher Nick D'Amuro kept track of time. Because students were instructed to vote for the candidate who had the best argument at each debate, the results varied. After the first debate, Alex was the winner of the popular vote with 75 votes, while Kayla was the winner of the panel vote with seven votes. After the second debate, Glenn was the winner of the popular vote with 61 votes and Alex was the winner of the panel vote with four votes. After the final debate, Glenn was the winner of the popular vote with 156 votes and Alex and Kayla tied for the panel vote with 11 votes each.

D'Amuro was pleased with the support from the audience. "I am so happy to hear from teachers and students that they are excited about these debates and the election," he said. "I am so excited that our students are going above and beyond to discuss the current political climate." District Superintendent

Robert D'Angelo agreed. "Nick and his students did an outstanding job with each and every debate," said D'Angelo. "I was very proud to attend them and was impressed with the number of students and staff in the audience each time. This activity was a perfect example of authentic instruction and learning. I am confident that our students' knowledge of both the political issues surrounding this presidential election as well as our political process have been greatly enhanced by these debates."

The Current Events class discussed the results from all three debates and decided that Kayla's team consistently had the best performances and deserved to win. "The students in our district tend to lean towards the ideals of Trump on several subjects," said D'Amuro. "However, the other candidates did such an excellent job with their arguments that I think students, along with teachers, really kept an open mind. In our political system, many voters make up their minds before November rolls around, based on their own opinions, so to see teachers and students really thinking about their choices was excellent."

Holley Joins Forces With Kendall for Wrestling Team This Year



Wrestlers from the Holley and Kendall Central School Districts will combine to form the joint Holley-Kendall Wrestling Team this year. The number of Kendall students interested in wrestling has declined recently, so both school boards approved a joint team to keep the sport alive for those who have a passion for it. No one is more passionate about the sport than Holley-Kendall Varsity Wrestling Coach John Grillo. "Personally, I'm very excited about it," said Grillo. "We're saving opportunities for student athletes by combining the teams." Grillo is also Genesee Region League Wrestling Chairman and said Attica has joined forces with Batavia for the same reasons.

Grillo has the most wins of any coach in New York State, with his record currently standing at over 700. He explained that Kendall athletes will be bussed to Holley for practices and meets, with one match scheduled at Kendall. Students in grades 7-12 will be eligible to join the Varsity team. Rich Williams, a Kendall Youth Coach, will assist in coaching the Varsity team alongside Grillo. Grillo's son, Andrew, will also assist in coaching the Varsity team, and Andrew will coach the modified team, too. The youth programs

will be left intact at both schools.

Grillo and Holley Athletic Director Dan Courtney met with Kendall Athletic Director Kevin Watson and Kendall Modified Wrestling Coach Tige Noni and they said that 10 athletes are interested in participating from Kendall and 20 from Holley. Their goal is to eventually have a team of 40-45 athletes who qualify to cover all the weight classes. Weight classes range from 99-285 pounds. "Wrestling is a hard sport to coach," said Grillo. "You have to have 15 athletes, in all different weight classes, ready to go at every match. Nationwide, there are fewer weight classes than there used to be. No other sport is like this, so it's a struggle to fill the weight classes. We have been fortunate to be able to fill all the weight classes throughout the years."

Grillo plans to work on modifying the wrestling uniform since there is a need to have new uniforms created to reflect the joint team name. Holley will supply the practice gear. Kendall has offered to share wrestling supplies. Senior Night, Staff Night, Alumni Night and Parent Night will be combined for both schools at Holley home meets. Staff Night would be a new event for Holley, with athletes asking a faculty or staff member from

their school to represent them at the match and cheer them on from their corner.

"The students will be treated equally," said Grillo. "Students from both schools will each have a chance to earn a starting spot. If you win your wrestle-off, you are the top wrestler in that class for the time being. I'm telling the athletes to throw away their pride and turn their rivalry into a force to be reckoned with as a joint team." Grillo and Courtney both agreed that the news of a joint team has been received positively by Holley students. "The students will adapt quickly," said Courtney. "We have the potential to be a better team this year," said Grillo. "If all the pieces of the puzzle fit right, we'll be a strong team. There will be more competition during practice, which is exciting."

On Dec. 23, there will be a Holley-Kendall Alumni Wrestling Match. Grillo looks forward to that since he coached all three of his sons during their years at Holley. With Holley Hawks and Kendall Eagles competing together, they will be a living example of the idiom "birds of a feather flock together."

FIT4U! Fall Session Full of Activities

Students were very busy attending various FIT4U! sessions this fall. The Games, Games and More Games class taught by Amie Callen was large enough to be split into two sessions, so first graders attended on Mondays and kindergarteners attended on Thursdays. The African Dance class taught by Sally Martin had one of the highest attendance records this session. The After School Friends Club led by Jean Smith proved to be popular again this year. The next session of FIT4U! began on Nov. 28 and will end Jan. 27 so students have a chance to participate in new sessions. The FIT4U! program is made possible by the Carol M. White Physical Education Program grant that Holley received two years ago.



Topics in Science Students Attend U of R Session

Dan Burke's Topics in Science students spent a day at the University of Rochester Medical School in the Life Sciences Learning Center (LSLC). Burke's class is a science elective for juniors and seniors. The LSLC provides hands-on learning to increase science literacy and enthusiasm for life sciences. Students worked in the teaching laboratories using the latest science equipment and supplies, while learning a variety of laboratory techniques.

Students also participated in an over-the-counter (OTC) drug research and development class titled "Medicines and Me III." They learned how basic science is used to develop OTC drugs and determine the most effective doses. They were taught how clinical research on OTC drugs helps identify effectiveness and side effects. Students studied how drugs are marketed to consumers. They used different laboratory methods to detect a substance by adding antibodies that reacted to it, which helped determine the safety of a potential OTC drug.
