Holley Schools Enters Final Phase of Capital Project

Holley Central School District will complete its last phase of the Capital Improvement Project by fall of 2017. On Dec. 13, 2016, they will accept bids for this third and final phase. By the end of the project, over \$30 million of improvements will have been made to district facilities, at zero tax impact to taxpayers.

Throughout the phases of the Capital Improvement Project, large transformations have taken place. A complete renovation of the Middle School/High School (MS/HS) has been accomplished, providing a state-of-the-art library media center, auditorium, dining hall and classrooms; and a new bus loop and student drop off loop were created. A completely new Transportation Center now houses a bus wash bay, which helps extend the life of the busses and keeps them in better shape. A new football stadium and an all-weather track were installed for the use and enjoyment of all district residents.

There are more large transformations planned for the last phase of the Capital Improvement Project in 2017. New tennis courts will be constructed, and some existing tennis courts will be renovated to become basketball courts. This will add another physical education teaching station and allow community use of the courts when school is not in session. Both the MS/HS and Elementary School (ES) will have heating, ventilating and air conditioning (HVAC) units replaced, and the ES will have windows and doors

replaced, which will increase overall energy efficiency. The ES will have two new playgrounds next year, along with a new bus loop to separate busses from car traffic.

"The entire project has provided the district with one of the finest facilities in Western New York, from both an instructional and extracurricular standpoint," said District Superintendent Robert D'Angelo. "Over the past few years, it's been great to see the community enjoy using the track and fitness center, attending performances in the auditorium, and noticing the improvements made at large for students, especially at the MS/HS. I look forward to the end of the project, and all the additional benefits it will bring to the students and community. Our long-term goal for the campus is to maintain it as a state-of-the-art school facility and learning environment."

The Eastern Orleans Jr. Hawks nominated the department for the award because of the stellar conditions of the youth football field and the district's facilities as a whole. They were impressed with how well-maintained, clean and welcoming the campus is, showing a high level of hard work and dedication by this department. BOE Vice President Robin Silvis presented Director of Facilities John Sherman with the award plaque at the meeting. "The Buildings & Grounds Department supports our community's youth by doing their job, but the time and energy put into the extras stands alone," said Silvis. "Our football fields and the surrounding areas are always top notch. They make it

possible for our youth to not only play on beautiful grounds, but they helped make a portable scoreboard possible for use in each contest, which is absolutely outstanding. They make the cheer mats available for our cheerleaders; they seamlessly provide everything possible that our young athletes need."

The award is named after Jim Ellegate, who was a football coach for the RoyHart Rams Beginner Football Team until he died coming home from a football game. Ellegate gave freely of his time, volunteering to coach football and baseball, and acting as a Cub Scout leader. NOFA's Executive Board and Commissioners created the award to keep Ellegate's spirit alive. It is awarded to a person or organization that shows their passion for the love of the game and for the love of children.



Using Games to Teach by Lisa Osur, MS/HS Librarian

Tsing games to teach is not a new concept. Games are often used at the elementary level to teach collaboration, problem solving and key ideas. However, playing board games in middle and high school classrooms using curriculum-aligned board games is a new tool encouraged in the Holley MS/ HS Library.

The MS/HS Library has always had board games students can check out and play; many are childhood favorites such as Monopoly, Sorry and Scrabble. This year, the library has built a board game collection that teaches specific topics while engaging students, providing context and practice, and connecting our students to the content.

The new games are:

- Freedom: The Underground Railroad
- Pandemic: Can you save humanity?
- Evolution: The beginning
- Code Master: Programming Logic
- Twilight Struggle: The Cold War, 1945-1989

Several of the games have corresponding books written by Christopher Harris and Patricia Harris, Ph.D. Christopher Harris is the School Library System Director for Genesee Valley Educational Partnership whose passion is using games to educate, and he is a wonderful, local source for us in Western NY. He has an enormous game library. The books provide lessons with historical background information, a lesson plan, primary source documents, worksheets and assessment ideas.

The books are:

- "Teaching the Underground Railroad Through Play"
- "Teaching the American Revolution Through Play" (goes with 1775 -Rebellion game which is on order)
- "Teaching Financial Literacy Through Play" (works with several games)
- "Teaching Programming Concepts Through Play" (works with Code Master game and others)
- "Teaching Secondary Science Through Play" (works with Evolution and Pandemic games)

When asked, students said that games increased their interest in school, provided a more interesting way for them to learn, made it easier for them to understand difficult concepts, and personalized their learning (Project Tomorrow 2016 http://tomorrow.org).

Alternative High School Hosts Thanksgiving Feast





Holley HS Students Interact with Their Community This Holiday Season

In late November, Holley High School **⊥**students volunteered to set up the Elementary Primary Gym for the Holley Days of Shopping event on Dec. 1-2. The students worked with Social Worker Samantha Zelent to bring donated gift items to the Elementary School, sort them into categories and arrange them on tables, floors, shelves and the stage so that district families could shop for holiday presents. The shopping event helped 53 families, including 141 children, receive gifts this year. Any remaining items went to the Community Center. "A big thank you to those who donated their time, money and/or gifts to make this event so wonderful," said Erica Bailey, Elementary School social worker and coordinator of Holley Days of Shopping. "All who attended were very appreciative of the opportunity. Several stated that without this support, their children would not be receiving gifts this year. Many of the students who volunteered their time at the shopping event are part of the new Interact Club at Holley MS/HS. This group is sponsored by the Holley Rotary Club. About 30 students in grades 7-12 have joined in its first year. Their focus is on volunteer work at both local and global levels. They have already volunteered at the Rotary



Beefeater dinner, and shopped and wrapped presents for seven Holley children, using money provided by the Rotary Club. They are assisting teachers at the Elementary School, and they will help with a spaghetti dinner in January to benefit a Holley family. They plan to volunteer at a soup kitchen soon and conduct a prom dress drive in the winter for the MS formal dance. They're also planning a book drive in the spring, where books will be shipped to children in another country. Rotary member John Heise is the Rotary Club liaison and Holley MS/HS Social Worker Samantha Zelent and Art Teacher Evinn Neadow are the staff advisors. "Whatever volunteer work the students want to do or ideas they have to help, we make it happen," said Zelent, who is Heise's daughter and very familiar with Rotary Club efforts over the years. "This is a

great opportunity for students to interact with the community, and it empowers them to help meet some of the needs they've identified in their environment that need support."

Zelent has been excited to see so many students who want to participate in the Interact Club. She has also been happy to see the support from Holley alumni to provide donations for the Holley Days of Shopping and to sponsor about 30 students this holiday season. "Former students who have graduated in the last five years have been contacting me asking how they can help," said Zelent. "Many of them are still going to school or just getting started in their careers, but they still want to give back. Isn't that fantastic? We live in such a caring community."

The 10th grade students researched each revolution and then they were split into teams to represent each revolution. Hennard instructed students to prepare examples of how life changed in each revolution. The teams prepared opening and closing statements and asked and answered questions from the opposite team, trying to persuade each other and the audience that one revolution had more of an impact on society than the other.

The students appeared very knowledgeable and passionate in their arguments. "I was very happy to see students were able to think on their feet, but still have a respectful debate," said Hennard. "I was happy with the exchange of ideas as each team challenged the other to explain their claims. Overall, I was pleased to see students come out of



their shells and do more than I expected." The students on each team, along with students in the audience, completed feedback forms on the performance of both teams. The Global Studies 2 students also had a chance to evaluate themselves as a team and as individuals. Hennard said that the feedback forms will determine the winner of the debate in each class period.

The debate came about as a way for the social studies department to assess what students were learning after spending time studying these historic events. The assessment process was developed through the Teaching is the Core grant that Holley received two years ago.
