Superintendent's Message

School Closings Due to Inclement Weather

Cince last year's winter was so mild and it did not impact the start of the school day, I'd like to review the various procedures associated with school closings during inclement weather. Most school superintendents are tuned in to the weather stations the night before a forecasted inclement weather event and they stay in communication with one another. On the morning of bad weather in our district, a decision must be made about the start of school by 5:30 a.m., as most of our buses are on the road by 6 a.m. In addition to that, the safe arrival of staff is also of prime consideration. The decision to close school or delay the start of school is based upon weather forecasts and conditions at the time, at approximately 5-5:30 a.m. Regardless of the outcome of a bad weather forecast, the safety of our students and staff is always of prime concern in making the decision to either close or delay opening. Another element involved in this decision is the weather forecast for dismissal time, as it is just as important to be able to get everyone home safely as it is to get everyone to school safely. A few weeks ago, some school districts south of Buffalo were impacted due to weather conditions that arrived quickly after the start of school; some students and staff spent the night at school, as it was deemed unsafe to put buses on the road. Many parents were

very appreciative that those districts made the decision to keep students and staff in school where they were safe. Students and staff made the best of things as they had dinner, used the gym and library, and socialized with their friends and teachers.

rmed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery Test (ASVAB) will be administered at the MS/HS on Feb. 27. If you plan on enrolling in the military upon graduation, this test is mandatory. Any student in grades 10-12 who is interested in taking the exam needs to register with Kristina Tese in the Guidance Office. If you would like to know more about which careers you would be successful in, then register for the test. The ASVAB workshop to review and discuss student results will be on March 13.

Attention: Juniors

What are your plans after graduation? Attending college? Working full-time? Now is the time to start thinking about the direction you would like to take. Counselors recently met with juniors to discuss their PSAT results, create their accounts on www.collegeboard.com and do some career exploration in order to get them thinking about life after high school. If you haven't registered for the SAT/ACT, now would be the time to do so. Many four-year colleges require the exams as part of the admission process. Don't delay!

Attention: Seniors

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) has been available since Oct. 1 at www.fafsa.gov. The FAFSA is the source of all federal and state aid, loans and work study programs. The form must be completed online and submitted to each college before their due dates in order to be eligible for these programs. Additionally, worksheets can be printed out from the FAFSA website to assist in this process. As a reminder, do not mail the worksheets to the colleges. If you need additional assistance in completing these forms, please contact FAFSA directly at 1-800-4-fedaid (1-800-433-3243) or visit https://studentaid.ed.gov/ sa/home. If you are planning to attend a four-year institution, you will need to complete the application as soon as possible. Those students who have applied to two-year institutions should be making appointments to take placement tests. If you have already applied and been accepted to a two-year institution, you should be meeting with your advisors. As a reminder, please inform your counselor on which college(s) you have been accepted to.



The PTSA Cookie Dough Fundraiser will run from Feb. 13-27, with order pick up on March 30. Please support our student activities by participating in this fundraiser.




PAPAJ WINS FOOTBALL HONORS

Cenior Collin Papaj was recently honored with receiving a Silver Award Scholarship from the National Football Foundation. Out of the 30 senior football players that were invited to the National Football Foundation Scholarship Awards Banquet at Burgundy Basin on Dec. 12, he was one of eight to receive the Silver Award Scholarship. He also received a plaque and shirt. His name will be put in the College Football Hall of Fame as a National Football Foundation Scholar Athlete. Collin was one of many football players in Section V to apply for this scholarship, which was awarded based on performance in the classroom and on the field.

Collin has only played football for three years, but he has worked hard during his short stint. 

Geometry in Construction Class Makes Progress

C tudents in Russ Albright's and Tim Rogers' Geometry In Construction class are busy honing their math and construction skills this winter. They recently used the concept of slope and different formulas to determine how to design sets of stairs to meet overall height requirements. Then, they used their construction skills to build the stairs.

The Geometry in Construction class helps students learn how math concepts can be applied to real-world problems to create solutions. The skills they learn in this class, whether they be used in future jobs or to make home repairs, will be carried with them beyond high school. The 13 sophomores and juniors enrolled in this class are also working towards completing a service project this spring. They are creating a small house for Second Wind Cottages in Newfield, NY, a rescue mission that provides one-man shelters to homeless men.

After Mid-Winter Recess in February, students will begin building walls and trusses to form the framework of the house. They've already built a wooden

base to mount the structure on and they will learn to panel the interior walls. Ultimately, the house will be transported in pieces and assembled on the grounds of Second Wind Cottages, where it will be anchored to a concrete pad. Students will then be able to install windows. They will not be shingling the shelter or adding a roof, but they will complete the rest of the structure on site.

"Students like this class because they can see the realworld application of math," said Rogers. "Many students who don't traditionally perform well in math class are performing much better in this class." "I'm good at math anyway, so this class is fun," said student Zach Vanameron. Students in this class will take the Geometry Regents exam in June.
