Jump Rope For Heart Event Features Professional Jump Roper

n Jan. 27, Holley Elementary students attended an assembly to kick off the Jump Rope for Heart fundraiser for the American Heart Association. The assembly featured guest performer Rene Bibaud demonstrating her professional jump roping skills. She is a five-time world jump rope champion, ESPN commentator and former performer with Cirque du Soleil. She tours the country as a motivational speaker, leading school assemblies on the art of jump roping.

Bibaud told the story of how she wanted to join her school's jump rope team when she was in fifth grade, but she didn't qualify that year. Her goal was to make the team the next year, so she began practicing jump roping regularly, following the motto of "If I mess up, I pick up and keep on trying." She made the team in sixth grade and has been jump roping for 37 years. "I learned that if I give my best effort, work at my own pace, and make mistakes, but keep on trying, I will be successful," said Bibaud. She set a record of jumping rope 756 times in two minutes. Bibaud showed a clip of her performance with Cirque du Soleil to students. She then demonstrated her ability to do a jump rope/dance routine.

Bibaud selected three students from the audience and taught them how to jump rope. She also taught them a few jump rope tricks. Within a few minutes, all students were successful. She selected a new group of students and went down the line, jumping rope with each of them. She taught a few students how to double-dutch jump rope, including Sixth Grade Teacher Melanie Montague. Bibaud thanked the students, faculty and staff for their participation and attention during the assembly. One student answered back, "You are welcome; you were awesome!"

Bibaud also performed at the family Jump Rope for Heart event on Jan. 28. Holley has raised over \$250,000 in the 33 years they have participated in the event.

Orleans County can use the app to send out news alerts, hazardous weather alerts, evacuation routes and emergency shelter information. The Orleans Aware app can also be used to transmit public information about health issues and emergencies.

Students currently receiving free or reduced-price lunches should see their counselor for a fee waiver; act quickly, because the number of fee waivers is limited.

Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) **Test Workshop**

This workshop will be held in the MS/HS Computer Lab on March 13 to review the results of the test given on Feb. 27. During the workshop, students will become familiar with career exploration, and they are able to determine which careers/interests work best for them. All students who took the ASVAB test will be included in the workshop.

If you plan to attend college after graduation, you must fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible! Visit www.fafsa.gov to complete your form online. The FAFSA is the source of all federal and state aid, loans and work-study programs. The form must be completed online and submitted to each college before their due dates in order to be eligible for these programs. If you are planning on attending a community college after graduation, you should have already applied for admission. Once the deposit has been made, students can take free placement tests and register for classes. The earlier, the better!


PTSA News

PRE-K AND **KINDERGARTEN** REGISTRATION ON MARCH 15

Tolley Pre-K and Kindergarten Registration will occur on Wednesday, March 15 from 1-5 p.m. only. Registration will be held in the Elementary Library Classroom. Bring the following documents to register your child: birth certificate, immunization record and proof of residency (for example, utility bill). You will **not** be able to register without these documents.

Pre-K and Kindergarten health physicals are required to be completed by September 1, 2017.

No Pre-K registration will be allowed before March 15.

To be eligible to register for Pre-K, children must be 4 years old by December 1, 2017. To be eligible to register for Kindergarten, children must be 5 years old by December 1, 2017.

or Holley senior Zach Day, a dream came true when he signed with Gannon University on Feb. 1 to play Division II football.



He was named to the Genesee Region League All-Star Second Team as a sophomore and to the First Team the last two years. As a defensive player, he had 85 tackles for the past year, with 51 of them solo, taking 5 sacks and 8 tackles for a loss. As an offensive player, he ran a total of 524 yards and had 4 touchdowns.



Hawk Talks

n Friday, Jan. 20, students in the Humanities Class presented "Hawk Talks" to a panel of school officials and community members. Modeled after TED Talks, which are short, influential presentations from experts on a wide range of subjects and viewable on the Internet, the Hawk Talks served as Humanities students' final projects for the semester. The presentations illustrated students' exploration of ideas in two different fields: innovation and social issues.

To demonstrate innovation, two groups presented possible new products. The Umbrella-Pack was explained by presenters Chris Balys, Zach Day, Derek McArthur, Nick Merlau and Dylan McKay. It is a multi-functional backpack that doubles as both a backpack and an umbrella. The umbrella is attached to the backpack and folds down easily. It would provide a hands-free, dry or sun-protected day out for any user. For those who are frustrated with the grocery shopping experience, the Convenient Cart could be right up their aisle. Presented by Julianna Drewry, Helana McLean and Alexis Milazzo, this grocery cart would automatically scan items as they are put into the cart, tallying the grocery bill as consumers shop. There would also be an app that allows shoppers to connect to the cart itself and load or share coupons and recipes.

The next three groups presented social issues that are important to them. Hannah Ellsmore, Corinne Johnson, Katharina Reisenbauer and Kayla Thrower encouraged everyone to think outside the box when it comes to education and who fits where. Just because society dictates where students should fit and the paths they should take does not mean that they shouldn't continue to strive to create their own paths. To piggyback on that idea, Hannah Day and Angela Weaver asked the question: "Are we being set up to fail?" They discussed the different influences students have on them, from infancy and early childhood to high school. They also talked about the price of college and the bigger societal price that is potentially paid when loans cannot be paid back. This group also touched on the Governor's proposed free SUNY college education idea. The final group of Isaiah Flow, Trent Osborne, Collin Papaj and Nick Smith discussed how important it is to have room for discovery and creativity in today's classrooms. With an emphasis on state testing, the students wanted to make sure that authentic learning stays in the foreground, and it is not lost among scores and report cards.

The community panel was made up of Eileen Banker, a representative from Assemblyman Hawley's office; Principal Susan Cory; Assistant Principal Dan Courtney; Superintendent Robert D'Angelo; Attorney Doug Heath; Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES Communications Specialist Beth Nash; and Board of Education President Brenda Swanger. The Humanities Class is an elective class offered to juniors and seniors that gives students an opportunity to explore different aspects of culture and the various ways that people document and record the human experience.
