Constructing a New Appreciation for Math

Tt's been eight months since the Lintegration of the Geometry in Construction class at Holley MS/HS. In that time, students have built an affinity for math. "I never really liked math, but this class has changed my opinion," said senior Tyler Merritt. "Adding construction to it added a real-life aspect, and made it more interesting and hands-on. I'm doing really well in math now." Freshman Mikaela Auch agrees. "No matter what you struggle with in math, being able to apply it to real life makes it easier," she said. "I really enjoy doing math."

Fully aligned with Common Core Standards, the Geometry in Construction class integrates contextual learning between geometry and construction skills by showing students the real-life application of both. Geometry teacher Russ Albright and Technology teacher Tim Rogers teach the mathematics course, which is guided by the various construction tasks. The collaboration between educators is mirrored in the students' work as well. "When kids work collaboratively on a certain task, they jump right in and work hard to get the task completed," said Albright. "It is truly amazing and fun to watch."

Both teachers also indicated that they've seen student motivation increase. Geometry in Construction students have better attendance and higher test scores compared to their peers taking a traditional Regents geometry course. During a recent panel discussion with Monroe County educators, students described feeling "100 percent prepared for the Geometry Regents Exam."

In addition to Geometry in Construction, the MS/HS is also adding a program called Algebra I in Manufacturing Processes, Entrepreneurship and Design (AMPED). The class, expected to start in the 2017-18 school year, combines Algebra I and Business/Economics courses. It will give students the opportunity to work together to operate their own business. Both classes are described as "math with a purpose." "These classes are answering the age-old question of 'why do I need to learn math?" said Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES (BOCES 2) STEM Coach Leslie



Tanner. "It prepares students for careers that require creative problem-solvers who can collaborate and communicate effectively. This is exactly what our local workforce needs to fill jobs in demand."

Each course ends with a capstone project. In the Geometry in Construction class, students are building a house for homeless men in Ithaca, NY. Students said the community service connection made the course that much better. "It makes you feel good to do something not just for yourself," said sophomore Matthew Skehan. "We're changing someone's life."

crazy 8s club

irst and second grade students had a chance to participate in Crazy 8s Club this spring at Holley Elementary. Held after school on Wednesdays and Thursdays for an hour and a half, students worked with teacher Tara Bannister in small groups to reinforce math concepts in fun ways. Over eight weeks, the groups built glow-in-the-dark structures, cracked secret spy codes and played games like Toilet Paper Olympics.



On one afternoon, students used measuring tape to cut straws into different lengths and then fastened them together to form a small pipe organ. They experimented with blowing across straws that were dunked in and out of cups of water to determine the changes in sound. Students learned that the straw made a higher-pitched sound the more it was raised out of water. Who knew math could be so much fun?

MS/HS Students Celebrate The **Kentucky Derby In A Unique Fashion**

Holley MS/HS celebrated Kentucky Derby Day this year by hosting a hat fundraiser to support the Orleans County Animal Shelter. Students, faculty and staff donated money to wear their fanciest hats on May 5. Normally, wearing hats to school is against the dress code. In just one day, \$150 was collected and sent to the shelter. The Physical Education (PE) Department and Student Council jointly sponsored the fundraiser.



Annually, the PE Department displays fun facts about the Kentucky Derby. The horse race takes place on the first Saturday in May at Churchill Downs each year. Holley students learn about the traditions surrounding the Derby. PE staff also post information on the horses racing each year and students select who they think will win the race.



This year, Math Teacher Patti Gauer conducted a special math lesson involving horse racing. If her students answered math problems correctly, they moved their horses further down the "track" posted in her room.

As part of the school-wide celebration of Kentucky Derby Day, students also received a special lunch from the cafeteria staff, consisting of a southern chicken sandwich, chocolate pie and lemonade with mint leaves.

Fifth Grade Art Classes Make **Bookends for** Library

ifth graders in Mimi Reyngoudt's art class began creating designs for the Elementary School Library bookends this spring. They chose a favorite book (fiction or non-fiction), then created a design based on that book. They traced the shape of a bookend on a piece of white paper, then used the lightboard to trace a cover design and specified what colors should be used in each part of the design. They used carbon paper to transfer the design onto the metal bookend, then began painting the bookend in the specified colors. The bookends will resemble book covers, with the title of the book and author listed, and characters or scenes from the book painted on them.

School Library Media Specialist Julie Bader is excited to have the new bookends added to the library. While they will serve the practical purpose of keeping the books upright, they will also help refer readers to some new books that they may not have read yet. Well done, young Hawks!



Vans Sneaker Contest

MS/HS students in Evinn Neadow's Drawing & Painting class participated in the Vans Custom Culture contest this spring by decorating size 10 men's sneakers in any format they desired. Students could incorporate 2-D or 3-D forms of art into the sneakers and they could choose which style of sneaker they'd like to work on. Art students could decorate a pair of sneakers or work with a partner to design one-half of the pair. They could apply any design to the sneakers, but entries were judged in specific categories, such as art, music, sports, local flavor and technology. The sneakers that Holley students entered into the contest are currently displayed in the Art Show in the MS/HS Foyer. While none of these sneakers advanced into the next round of the competition, Neadow said that her students' designs were on par with

what was entered by other high school students in the nationwide contest. "They should be proud of themselves," she said. "I certainly am proud of them."

Biggest Winners Learn About **Preserving Foods**

n May 2, the Biggest Winner meeting attendees participated in a community educational seminar on preserving produce. At the monthly meeting in the Holley ES Café, Colin Butgereit, a master food preserver from the Orleans County Cooperative Extension, taught the audience how to preserve strawberries. Attendees were able to take home a few jars of strawberries. Butgereit's visit was made possible by the Carol M. White Physical Education Program grant that Holley received in 2014.

Butgereit provided the following information on food preservation.

Why Preserve Foods?

- It's an economical way to enjoy quality foods at home year-round, especially during the winter months when fresh, local foods are unavailable.
- You can save half the cost of buying commercially preserved foods in stores (not counting the cost of labor). An additional savings is found when you grow the food you plan to preserve.
- Less vitamins are lost. Unless produce is cooled or preserved, half the vitamins in fresh produce may be lost within a few days. Even refrigerated foods lose half or more of some vitamins within one to two days.
- Preserved foods do not include unnecessary preservatives or additives.
