HOMECOMING WEEK

Superintendent's Message: Getting Back to Basics: A Quality Education for All

any of you have followed the changing education trends relative to curriculum and instruction over the past 10 years. For far too long, the goals and objectives related to both curriculum and instructional practices have, at times, seemed to shift like the wind. Practices such as New Math, Regents Competency Tests, small group instruction, independent learning, grades 3-8 Math and ELA tests, and teacher and principal ratings have impacted our schools in the recent past. I am not passing judgement on the worth of each of these, as I will leave that up to each of you, but what I am advocating for is a return to the basics of educating kids: keeping children and staff safe, learning, and preparing students for the rest of their lives. I truly believe that these basic principles have gotten lost among each attempt to add a new twist to how we educate students.

I also believe that we need to focus on our students' interests beyond high school. A college degree is a great achievement and will, in most cases if applied well, assist any individual in making a positive contribution to his/her world. However, the college pathway is not for everyone. After speaking with the various contractors who have worked on our Capital Project, each and every one of them has told me that there is a serious shortage of men and women in Western New York who possess skills in the specific trades. Electricians, plumbers, carpenters, bricklayers and masons of all sorts are needed to satisfy the demand for these skills on construction jobs. Consequently, students who have a sincere desire to

work in the trades should be encouraged to do so. We need to make sure that we are providing those students with every opportunity to become successful.

New York State is well on its way to providing a quality education for every student as the State has adopted the Every Student Succeeds Act, a successor to No Child Left Behind. I mention this because this provides us with yet another opportunity to ensure student success, if we truly take advantage of it. We have a golden opportunity at Holley CSD, in that the time is right to help each student find where they want to be: college, military, the world of work or pursuing the mastery of a trade. Every minute of every day in every class must translate into maximizing our efforts toward the realization of a quality education for all. As long as home and school continue to work together on this, we can truly achieve that goal. One cannot do it without the partnership of the other. Please continue to work with us as we value the partnerships that we have developed with parents and the community-at-large. The best thing that we can do for our students is to become yet another resource for them as they prepare for the rest of their lives!

FIRE PREVENTION AT HOLLEY ELEMENTA



n Oct. 12, the Holley Fire Department demonstrated to the Pre-K-3 students at Holley Elementary School what to do in case of a fire. The students practiced stop, drop and roll; went through a simulated fire in a safety house and practiced their escape route; watched a fireman put on his protective gear; and learned about the different tools on the fire trucks. The firefighters didn't want the children to be afraid of them in their full gear so they demonstrated what it sounds like talking through a mask and how hard it is to hear with the head gear on. This is the first year that Holley students had a chance to

simulates a typical house layout.

Students from Holley Middle School/High School also participated in the fire prevention activities. Students in grades 6-12 are eligible to belong to the Youth Fire Group and they work with the Clarendon Fire Company, and Holley and Fancher Hulberton Murray (FHM) Fire Departments. Currently, 11 students in grades 6-12 belong to the group and several have joined the Clarendon Fire Company and Holley Fire Department. The students meet every Monday at the Clarendon Fire Company and receive the same training, with some restrictions, as adult firefighters. They use turnout gear donated by other fire departments. "There aren't many youth groups like this across the country, but this group has been at Holley for five years," said Clarendon Fire Assistant Chief Bob Freida. Firefighters Help Test Out Scientific Method

hile local firefighters were teaching fire prevention to elementary students, one student in Lisa Tubinis', Anna LaForce's and Kevin Selbig's Environmental Science class enlisted the firefighters' help with a project he was working on. Student Sebastian Bartholomew was tasked with using the scientific method to prove or disprove claims made about products in TV commercials. He decided to test whether a certain flashlight could withstand being run over by a fire truck and dropped from a great height. Positioning the flashlight under the fire engine's tires, the firefighters drove over the flashlight several times, but the flashlight remained operational. A fireman then took the flashlight with him to the top of the ladder truck and dropped it from a height of 75 feet. The first time, the flashlight held up to the impact with the ground; on the second attempt, the flashlight stopped operating. For these science students, "as seen on TV" takes on new meaning when replicating these product claims.

Holley Alum Wins \$50K on Food Network Show by Iva Petrosino, BOCES 2 Communications Support Specialist

7hen a young Steven Klatt was busy watching The Food Network instead of cartoons, he never imagined he'd grow up to appear on that network. Those days of watching cooking shows as a child would pay off for him as he and his team won the grand prize on the Food Network's food truck cooking competition.

Klatt, a Clarendon native and Class of 2005 Holley High School graduate, had the idea to apply for "The Great Food Truck Race" on The Food Network while he was feeding his infant daughter in the middle of the night. He lives in Charleston, SC, and had been working his way through the ranks of the food and beverage industry for the last 10 years. He pitched his idea to two friends, Nick Hunter and Brandon Lapp, and together, they came up with the idea for a food truck named Braised in the South, aka BITS.

Within a few months, the team was invited to join the cast of the "The Great Food Truck Race." After weeks of tough cooking challenges in various cities across the southeast, Klatt and his BITS partners beat out seven other food truck teams to win the top prize of \$50,000. "Being on the show was incredible," Klatt said. "The fact that we were able to take this idea for a food truck and run with it to win this show is just unbelievable. It's exceeded any career expectations I ever had for myself."

Retired Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES (BOCES 2) Teacher Kevin Bedard remembers Klatt

as a standout student during his years in the Culinary Arts program at the Career and Technical Education (CTE) Center. He said he was not surprised to see Klatt do so well on the show each week. "Steve was a teacher's dream; he thrived in both application and theory," said Bedard. "The enthusiasm for competition he had on 'The Great Food Truck Race' reminded me of the same competitive streak he had as a student competing in the New York State Restaurant Association's ProStart Invitational culinary competition."

Klatt said the basics he learned from Chef Bedard and others along the way were crucial to the success he had on the show and in his career so far. "I loved my time at BOCES 2 (CTE)," said Klatt. "Being there gave me an opportunity to learn about what I loved doing – being creative with cooking and entertaining. Chef Bedard was a huge influence and helped me decide to attend culinary school. Nick, Brandon and I are all classically-trained, technique-driven chefs. If you really know the basics of cooking, you can do so much with food and a little bit of creativity."

The Braised in the South food truck is now open for business in the Charleston area. Although he mostly cooks with a southern flair now, Klatt said he keeps trying to incorporate a bit of traditional Rochester cuisine. "I make a garbage plate at work probably about once a month," he said. "I make everyone eat it!"

Thanks to MS/HS Library Media Specialist Lisa Osur, students had an opportunity to participate in a unique teambuilding experience on Oct. 6 in the MS/HS Library. Each student held a string that was attached to a metal ring in the center of the room. Students worked together to lift a variety of objects off the ground and lower them back down to the floor. This task proved not to be as easy as it sounded.



During the class' debrief, students were asked to make a list of things that led to their success. All of the groups listed communication and leadership. These are the traits that will benefit them in the classroom and beyond.

Ride 4 Life Visits Holley MS/HS

n Oct. 6, a trio of motorcycle riders showed off their gravity-defying stunts in the MS/HS parking lot, entertaining students. The trio, known as the Ride 4 Life team, was there to not only display their colorful, noisy machines, but to deliver a powerful message to students. Lead presenter Scott Caraboolad told students that his goal with the Ride 4 Life team is to help target the drug epidemic in the U.S. and give people the opportunity to seek help. The team, made up of riders Caraboolad, Shane Croxton and Cody Brown, stopped in Holley as part of a three-day visit to Orleans County sponsored by local churches, law enforcement agencies and county health agencies.

Caraboolad shared his story with students, telling them he wished



someone had spoken to him like this when he was in high school. "You need to take certain things seriously," he said. When he was 17, he experienced family tragedy. He lost



nine family members within a fiveyear period, starting with his father. "I came from a good family, with no substance abuse issues," he said. "Once death began impacting my life, I didn't properly deal with it. I was in the hate tunnel, full of anger, pride and grief. I had achieved success as a motorcycle stunt rider at a young age, but I didn't have proper mentorship. I started hanging out in the wrong places with the wrong people. I was on that destructive path for the next 20 years." He spoke about his years of drug and alcohol abuse and time spent dealing with legal issues because of his behavior.

In 2011, nearing age 40, Caraboolad was suicidal. "I gave up hope on myself," he said. "I had the American dream – lots of money, a big house, a family - but I was empty inside." After being an atheist for many years, he found salvation in

his faith. "I stepped out of the darkness and into the light," he said. "I realized I needed to take responsibility for my actions and figure out my purpose in life. Once I began doing that, good things started happening to me. My family was restored to me. I learned through proper unconditional love – of myself, others, a higher power – there is hope." He also found having a mentor was invaluable to his recovery. He stated that in order to find one, he had to overcome ego and pride. "Reach out if you need help," said Caraboolad. "You will never find a mentor unless you ask for it." He found that these four keys are essential for him to stay in recovery: purpose, love, mentoring and hope.

After the presentation, Holley students posed for selfies on a mounted motorcycle and received autographs

from the Ride 4 Life team. Students were visibly moved by the presentation and took a few moments to share their thoughts with the stunt team.

Celebrating Apple Day in Pre-K by Allison Jaworski, Pre-K Teacher

n Sept. 26, Pre-K students in Allison Jaworski's and Amy Bennage's room had a lot of fun in centers celebrating Johnny Appleseed Day. Students conducted an apple experiment where they taste-tested three different kinds of apples and decided which one they liked best. They talked about apple color, whether the apple was crisp or soft, and if it tasted tart or sweet. At another center, students worked on scissor skills, counting to four, and sequencing one through four using apple pictures. At the independent table center, students made their own apples. To practice their pinch-grip and fine motor skills, they tore red, green and yellow construction paper

into small pieces, and glued them onto a plate. After adding a stem and leaf, their apples looked good enough to eat! On the rug, students sorted red, green and yellow apples, represented by soft pom-poms, and used special tweezers to place them high on their trees. When they were done, they counted all their apples.

- Is quick to blame others.
