The High School Concert Band performed "All Glory Told" and "Bandology," which were songs they performed in a national band competition in Annapolis in late March.

The Elementary Concert Band and Chorus staged a repeat performance for the elementary students on March 23. Elementary student Ryan Clausen earned the prize of being a guest conductor of one of the Fifth and Sixth Grade Band songs. He correctly matched the list of elementary teachers to their instruments or vocal skills, and he was the only student with 100 percent accuracy in this school-wide contest.

Elementary students who performed in the All-County concerts were recognized and received pins for their participation from their music teachers.

All performances in March gave students a chance to show off the skills they've learned through many hours of practice. The concerts also demonstrated the musical progression these students can make throughout the years as they advance through the music program at Holley.

Holley MS/HS Digital Readiness TEAM by Principal Susan Cory, MS/HS Library Media Specialist Lisa Osur and Instructional Technology Specialist Sarah Misco

his past fall, Holley MS/HS formed the Digital Readiness TEAM (DR TEAM) to proactively prepare for the improved connectivity, infrastructure and arrival of technology equipment to our school through the NYS Smart School Bond Act.

The DR TEAM is currently made up of an administrator, teachers, Information Technology (IT) staff and students. We will be reaching out to parents and the community in the coming year as we move forward.

The DR TEAM began by researching what has already occurred in local districts in terms of digital readiness. We attended conference sessions on 1:1 initiatives (rolling out computers to each student), and we participated in local events where districts shared their experiences. Holley has the advantage of following good examples from other districts who have gone through the process, learning from their mistakes, and receiving their shared practices and resources. All of the research we have done has helped us come to

the conclusion that successful techintegration depends on the following:

- Professional development for teachers
- Utilization of a Learning Management System (LMS), which is required by the Smart Bond Act. An LMS is a software application which allows for digital delivery and administration of a class, including class materials, assignment dropboxes, discussion forums and online formative assessments.
- A Digital Citizenship curriculum
- Communication and buy-in from all stakeholders

Given what we have learned, our goals for 2017-18 have been to:

- 1. Select and begin piloting an LMS
- 2. Evaluate professional development needs based on International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE) Standards
- 3. Find and/or develop a Digital Citizenship curriculum
- 4. Begin to involve, and communicate with, all stakeholders

Schoology has been identified as the LMS of choice, based on the recommendation of many districts within the Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES consortium. Schoology has been introduced to staff, and some are in the very initial stages of piloting the basic version. A Schoology subscription for the MS/HS will be available for the 2018-19 school year. Professional development will be planned throughout the year, with the expectation that all teachers will be using it by Fall 2019. Staff and students have taken an ISTE Tech Skills evaluation, and professional development is being planned based on the results. Digital Citizenship curriculum has been shared by local districts with us, and we will evaluate and personalize it for Holley over the summer.

The coming school year is going to be a very busy and exciting one as we keep working towards providing our students with the skills and resources they need to be future-ready.


Autumn Moy Wins GRTBF Program Design Contest

National Junior Honor Society Induction Ceremony



She told students how impressed she was with their accomplishments and how they made her feel optimistic for the future. "You guys get it," she said. NYS Excelsior Scholarship

The Excelsior Scholarship, in combination with other student financial aid programs, allows students to attend a SUNY or CUNY college tuition-free. The application for the 2018-19 academic year for new applicants is now open. Go to www.hesc.ny.gov/excelsior for more information and to find out how to apply. The application deadline is July 23, 2018. Current Excelsior Scholarship recipients should **not** complete this application.

To be eligible, an applicant must:

- be a resident of NYS and have resided in NYS for 12 continuous months prior to the beginning of the term;
- be a U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen;
- have either graduated from high school in the United States, earned a high school equivalency diploma, or passed a federally approved "Ability to Benefit" test, as defined by the Commissioner of the State Education Department;
- have a combined federal adjusted gross income of \$110,000 or
- be pursuing an undergraduate degree at a SUNY or CUNY college, including community colleges and the statutory colleges at Cornell University and Alfred University;
- be enrolled in at least 12 credits per term and complete at least 30 credits each year (successively), applicable toward his or her degree program;
- if attended college prior to the 2018-19 academic year, have earned at least 30 credits each year (successively), applicable toward his or her degree program prior to applying for an Excelsior Scholarship;
- be in a non-default status on a student loan made under any NYS or federal education loan program or on the repayment of any NYS award;
- be in compliance with the terms of the service condition(s) imposed by a NYS award that the applicant has previously received; and
- execute a Contract agreeing to reside in NYS for the length of time the award was received, and, if employed during such time, be employed in NYS.

To complete the application, eligible students will need:

- to complete the 2018-19 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and the TAP Application,
- copies of 2016 New York State income tax return(s) filled by students and their parent(s) or students' spouses, as applicable.

Interact Club Members Attend Leadership Seminar

Tolley Interact Club members journeyed to Albion High School on March 22 to learn from local community leaders. Holley students attended the Rotary Interact Leadership Seminar with Albion student leaders. The focus of the seminar was "Service Above Self," which is also part of the Rotary Club motto. The Holley Rotary Club sponsors the Interact Club at Holley MS/HS.

Five community members talked to students about how they can take action in their communities to make a positive impact on their world. The seminar speakers were Albion Schools Superintendent and President of the Albion Rotary Club Michael Bonnewell; Pastors Aligned for Community Transformation (PACT) Founder and Harvest Christian Fellowship Reverend Tim Lindsay; Clarendon Code Enforcement Officer, Clarendon Historian and Holley Board of Education member Melissa Ierlan; Orleans County Sheriff Randy Bower; and former State Assemblyman Charlie Nesbitt.

Nesbitt shared with students his story of being a helicopter pilot during the Vietnam War. When he was 20, he was tasked with extracting a Special Forces unit from Laos, where the unit's chopper had crashed. Under enemy fire, he picked up the crew. When they realized one member was missing, Nesbitt turned around and rescued him, even though his chopper was low on fuel. Nesbitt received the Distinguished Flying Cross for his actions. He told students that his experience taught him that leaders identify a problem and develop a strategy to solve it, often using tenacity to get the job done. "With leadership, the key element is vision," he said. "You have to understand the situation and imagine the outcome." He urged students to give back to their communities throughout their lives, just like he has done. "It's within any individual to make a difference," he said.

Bonnewell advised students not to wait to make an impact on their community; they can begin now. "Don't wait until



you're settled in your career," said Bonnewell. "The world is yours now and you can shape it." Lindsay agreed with Bonnewell about students acting now. "Do you want to be part of the solution?" Lindsay asked students. "Identifying the problem is easy." His organization, PACT, has been trying to tackle poverty and drug addiction, two of the biggest challenges in the community. He urged students to be character driven in their lives, especially during the ages of 16-26. "The decisions you make now will affect you later on," he said. "Live for something bigger than yourself. You can leave a great legacy behind you when you live for others."

Bower told students to have a "strong moral compass" to guide their decisions and actions, and to help them overcome any challenges. He advised students to always look people in the eye and not be overly distracted by their electronic devices. "Make eye contact and engage in conversation with those around you," said Bower. "Have a firm handshake. These are the things you need to do, especially when you're interacting with, and trying to impress, adults."

Ierlan advised students to get a job, work hard and not ask for handouts. "Parents keep giving you things, like cars and phones, but when they don't make you pay for car insurance or the phone bill, you're receiving a handout from them, and that doesn't help you in the long run," she said. "If you want to find out how to help others, call your village and town clerks for ideas or contact the historical societies. They always need help with projects."

Bower seconded Ierlan's advice about volunteering. He told students that local youth sports leagues need coaches. Student athletes, as well as recent graduates, would be ideal candidates to work with the younger kids. Service clubs, churches and fire departments are always seeking new members, too.

Holley MS/HS Social Worker and Interact Club Advisor Samantha Zelent said there are many stereotypes that exist about today's young people being lazy and self-absorbed, but she doesn't agree with these assessments. "These kids will change this world when they are motivated and asked to act," she said. Ierlan agreed, talking about how supportive and active Holley students have been with many community partnerships over the last several years. "We have tons and tons of people in our area who model 'Service Above Self' every day," Ierlan said.
