Sixty-four seniors graduated from Holley Middle School/High School (MS/HS) on June 29. All students wore red caps and gowns as they filed onto the field in the Holley Hawks Stadium. Forty-one graduates will head off to higher education, 15 will join the workforce, three will join the military, two are undecided and three foreign exchange students will return to their home countries. Graduates received over \$25,000 in local scholarships and awards, and are eligible for up to \$400,000 in specific college scholarships.

Class of 2019 President Abrianna Kruger and Vice President Julia Smith started the ceremony. High School Student Council President Aaron Strathearn presented the class gift of a \$500 gift card to Garden Factory to be used to add flowers and trees to the campus landscaping in memory of Holley students and staff members who have died. Salutatorian

Abrianna Kruger and Valedictorian Shawna Lusk gave their speeches to an audience that filled the bleachers and grounds surrounding the stadium. Graduates were acknowledged with awards from Senior Class Advisor Suzanne Lepkowski. MS/HS Special Education Teacher Shawna Benzan gave the commencement address, encouraging students to overcome their fears as they venture into the next chapters of their lives.

After Holley staff announced the graduates' names and future plans, MS/HS Principal Susan Cory posed with the graduates after giving them their diplomas. Superintendent Brian Bartalo and the Board of Education members offered handshakes to the graduates on their way back to their seats. Graduates adjourned to the corner of the field by the scoreboard for the traditional cap toss photo.

Administrators are also hard at work all summer to hire new staff, construct schedules and plan for what will be a great academic year at Holley.

This year, we have had the chance to reflect a great deal and determine some plans to help us improve, particularly in the areas of instruction and the overall culture of our schools. In the fall, you will be introduced to two new positions within the district that help lead the way in these efforts. We have created a Director of Teaching

and Learning position, which will be a district-level administrator in charge of curriculum, instruction and assessment, along with instructional technology integration. We are very excited to have a strong leader working with us in this area. We will also be introducing a new Middle School Coordinator, which will be a Teacher On Special Assignment (TOSA) who will be responsible for the management (discipline) of our middle school students and coordinate efforts to provide the best education possible for those very important "middle years." Due to our state designation as a "Target District," we were able to secure grant funding to support us in the creation of this TOSA position. We are very excited to have one of our own in a leadership role at our MS/HS to help staff and students be as successful as possible.

Holley Budget Passes and Two Board Members Elected

On May 21, Holley voters passed the budget with 335 yes votes and 170 no votes. Both propositions passed - one for the purchase of school buses with 331 yes votes and 198 no votes, and the other to support the Holley Community Free Library with 378 yes votes and 151 no votes.

Holley voters also elected two members to the Board of Education, each with three-year terms: John Heise (340 votes) and Anne Winkley (132 votes).

The District congratulates the members of the board on their election and thanks voters for supporting our budget and propositions.

BLAST Program Offered to School Athletes This Summer

Holley Central School District is pleased to announce that the BLAST program (Biomechanical Learning And Stability Training) will return to Holley MS/HS this summer to help students in grades 7-12 stay conditioned for sports. Leroy Physical Therapy & Village Fitness offers this program on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 9-10:30 a.m. from July 16 to August 15. This session is offered for free to Holley students as part of our Athletic Training contract with LeRoy Physical Therapy. Sessions will be held on the Holley Central School District campus. Students will meet in the MS/HS Foyer each day.

Transportation to school for this session is not provided. Students can enjoy a **free** breakfast in the MS/HS Dining Hall before or after each session.

Free Summer Breakfast and Lunch Program

In partnership with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Holley Central Schools will offer **free** breakfast and lunch to all children age 18 and younger, from July 8-Aug. 16. Children age 18 and younger who live in the district this summer are eligible for this program, regardless of income level. Pre-registration is not required. Transportation will not be provided by the district for this program.

Breakfast will be served from 8-11 a.m. and lunch from 11 a.m.-1 p.m., Monday through Friday, in the Middle School/High School Dining Hall.

Adults may also purchase breakfast and lunch during this program. Breakfast is \$2.60 and lunch is \$4.35.

Soaring Awards

Several "Soaring to New Heights" awards were distributed at the Holley Board of Education (BOE) meeting on May 21. This award is given monthly to deserving students and adults who go above and beyond expectations, and lend their skills and abilities to help others. Congratulations to all of this month's recipients!

Seniors Kory Puente and Braden Ferranti received Soaring awards from Middle School/High School (MS/HS) Principal Susan Cory for their achievements in gaining vocational skills. Both students attend the Career and Technical Education (CTE) program at Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES; Kory for dental assisting and Braden for HVAC. Kory placed first place in the state Health Occupation Students of America (HOSA) competition and will go on to compete in the international competition. Braden's team placed first in the state-wide SkillsUSA competition; he competed using his plumbing skills in the

Teamworks contest. Next, he will compete with his team in the national competition. He is the only CTE student to compete at the national level two years in a row.

Junior Allana Knopp received a Soaring award from Cory for taking third place in a digital photography competition. Her work "Teepee" was featured in the May issue of the *Dimension*; it was also featured in the display cases in the MS/HS Foyer during the Art Show.

Senior Greg Morrill received a Soaring award from Cory for being named to the Varsity Masterminds Regional All-Star Team.

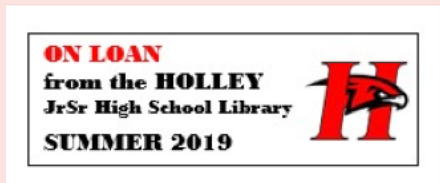

School and Public Library Serving the Community Together

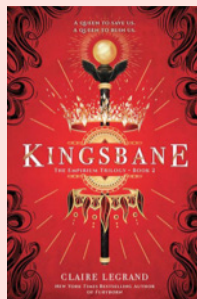
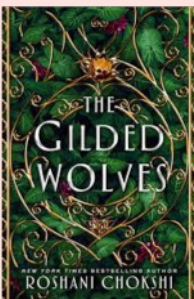

The Holley MS/HS Library partners with the Holley Community Free Library each year to share resources during the summer months. We work together on a lot of projects throughout the school year - inter-library loans, author visits, makerspaces, literacy events and more - but this collaboration benefits our students and the community **all summer long**.

Every May/June, students begin selecting which MS/HS Library books they would like to have access to throughout the summer. In some cases, students begin reading a series, so the entire series goes in the "on loan" box; other times, it's something brand-new that the Holley Community Free Library does not own. Some of the selections are simply materials that are checked out frequently, so an extra copy is welcomed. These 50-75 books are labelled as "ON LOAN from the HOLLEY JrSr High School Library" and the public library adds a temporary barcode to them so they can circulate. The books are delivered to the public library during the last week of school, and picked up the week of Labor Day.

If students do not currently have a Holley Community Free Library card, they are welcome to stop in at the public library to sign-up for one anytime. Many of our students have said they think they have a card, so we encourage them to stop in to the library to renew, activate or sign-up for a new card.

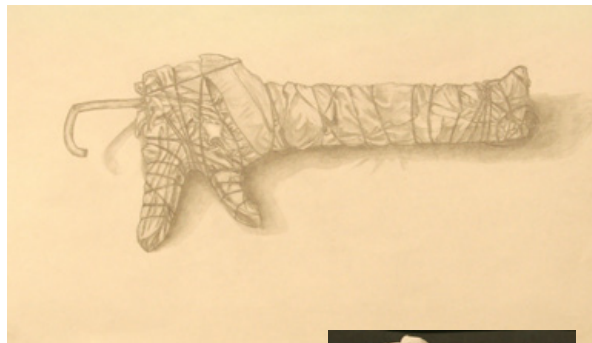

Holley Students Witness the Results of Unwise Decisions

On June 7, Holley seniors attended an assembly and mock accident scene to understand the results of driving while under the influence of alcohol. After watching a video of a party that their classmates attended, students transferred to the parking lot, where two vehicles had collided. One student had crashed through the windshield of one vehicle and the remaining students were trapped and appeared unresponsive in both vehicles. Students portraying the victims of the accident were made up to look like they were injured.

The Holley police, ambulance and fire departments responded. The emergency responders enacted what they would do at the scene of a two-car motor vehicle crash with injuries and a fatality. The fire department worked to free the victims from the vehicles. The driver of one car was questioned by police and went through a sobriety field test before he was handcuffed and placed in the back of a police car. After students were evaluated by ambulance and fire department personnel, two were loaded onto stretchers and placed in ambulances. The coroner had the "deceased" student's mother identify her before she was zipped into a body bag.

Students filed back into the MS/HS Auditorium to witness the re-enactment of the

arraignment and sentencing hearing against the "arrested" student in front of a judge. Orleans County District Attorney Joe Cardone presented the charges against the student to Orleans County Court Judge Sanford Church while Public Defender Joanne Best negotiated for lesser sentencing. Church talked through the possible sentencing decisions he would make in a case like this and answered students' questions about the legal process. "Try to avoid bad decisions so you can have more fun," said Church. Cardone echoed those sentiments. "It's important for the next few years for you to put yourself in a position to have the best opportunities," he said. "The few moments it takes you to make a bad decision is going to affect you for the rest of your life." Best reiterated the seriousness

of the re-enactment. "These situations we present to you are real, they happen to a lot of people," she said. "If you're convicted of charges like this, you can't apply for a driver's license until after you turn 21."

Holley Police Chief Roland Nenni told students to have those "courageous conversations" with friends. "You have to be courageous and talk to that friend who should not be driving," said Nenni. "Tell them not to drive. Call 911 if you can't get home because you know you're too impaired to drive or your ride is too impaired to drive. We will find a way to get you home. Please make good decisions."

Principal Susan Cory urged students to think before they get behind the wheel. "Studies have shown that watching an assembly like this only affects students up to 48 hours after the event," she said. "Since tonight is your prom, I want you to use your heads and make smart decisions. I want to see you at graduation." She reiterated that the consequences for arriving at prom under the influence of drugs or alcohol would mean that students are suspended from school and cannot participate in any senior activities, including graduation. She read a letter to students from the family of a former student who died in a car accident.



Hawks Play Unified Basketball Against Kendets

On May 16, the Holley Hawks Unified Basketball Team played against the Kendall-Hilton Kendets team in the Kendall Junior/Senior High School Gym. This is the fourth year that Holley has participated in this league. Unified sports brings together students with cognitive disabilities and those without to compete together on an authentic school team. While this program provides an opportunity to play a sport, it also promotes understanding of differences and displays how these differences can be overcome with the involvement of all.

What is it like to attend a Unified Sports basketball game? You'll see and hear more direction given from coaches and teammates, so that players are at the right end of the court and in their proper position. There's

more kindness exhibited, with players handing off the ball to teammates who haven't had a chance to make a basket yet. There's plenty of supportive cheering from the stands, as the hosting team's friends and families, as well as the opposing team's fans, encourage all players to shoot for the basket, hustle down the court or pass to a teammate.

There's a lot more dancing, not just at half-time, but at any time when there's a time-out and dance music is playing. Both teams participate in the dancing, and spectators from the stands come down onto the court to dance with them. The referees indulge players with this break as they shake their heads and smile, waiting for the teams to be ready to resume play.

Fouls are still called. Players fight for possession of the ball. Mad basketball skills are exhibited as players streak down the court and attempt to sink a shot at the hoop. The action may or may not be as fast, but the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat for each team are the same. However, these players seem to let the wins and losses roll off their backs as they become anxious to participate in the next game, work on their ball-handling skills or cheer on their teammates. Everyone looks forward to the next season and how they will work together as a cohesive unit once again. With a successful support system like this, who wouldn't want to participate?

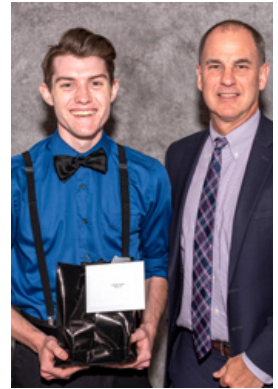
Senior Breakfast

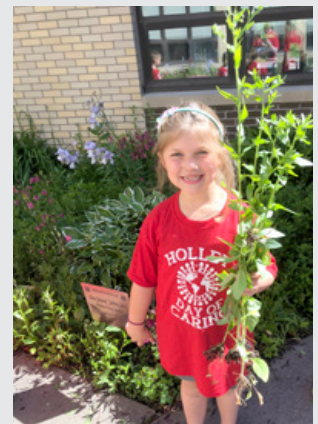

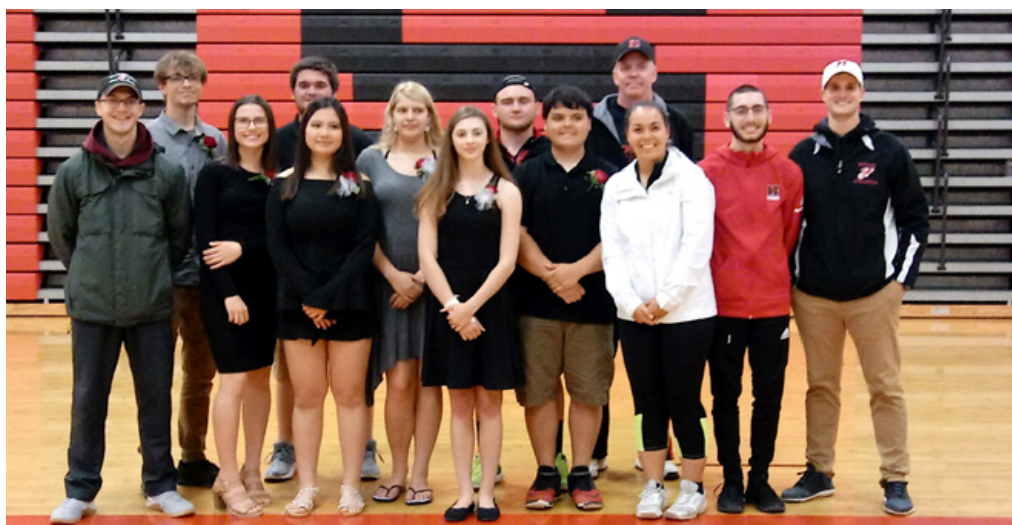

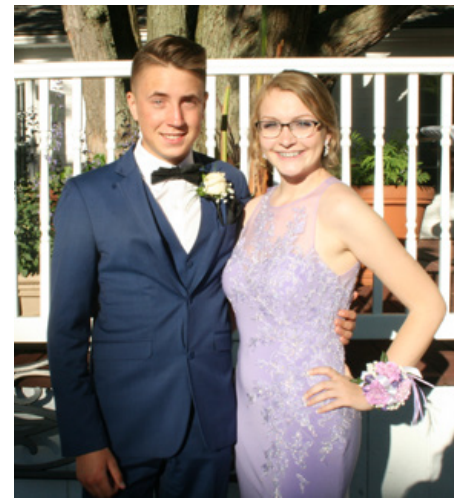
