Download the Orleans Aware Preparedness App

Orleans County residents can now download the Orleans Aware Preparedness App to their mobile devices. This free app helps residents prepare and protect themselves and their families in case of a disaster. The Orleans Aware app is available to anyone using an iOS or Android device and can be downloaded directly from the App Store or Google Play.

To download:

- Select **App Store** if using an iPhone or **Google Play** if using an Android smartphone
- Click **GET** icon
- Launch the app

The app includes interactive and instructional guides to help users prepare for emergencies. Orleans County can use the app to send out news alerts, hazardous weather alerts, evacuation routes and emergency shelter information. The Orleans Aware app can also be used to transmit public information about health issues and emergencies.

Fire Prevention at Holley Elementary

On Oct. 10, the Holley Fire Department demonstrated to the Pre-K-grade 3 students at Holley Elementary School what to do in case of a fire. The students practiced stop, drop and roll; went through a simulated fire in a safety house and practiced their escape route; watched a fireman put on his protective gear; and learned about the different tools on the fire trucks. The firefighters didn't want the children to be afraid of them in their full gear so they demonstrated what it sounds like talking through a mask and how hard it is to hear with the head gear on. This is the third year that Holley students had a chance to tour the safety house provided by Orleans County that better simulates a typical house layout.



Students from Holley Middle School/High School also participated in the fire prevention activities. Students in grades 6-12 are eligible to belong to the Youth Fire Group. This group has expanded to include members who attend Kendall, Albion and Rush Henrietta schools, bringing current membership numbers to 12. The Youth Fire Group works with the Clarendon Fire Company, and Holley and Fancher Hulberton Murray (FHM) Fire Departments. They meet every Monday at the Clarendon Fire Company and receive the same training, with some restrictions, as adult firefighters. They use turn-out gear donated by other fire departments. Earlier in October, they ran in the Stephen Siller Tunnel to Towers 5k in Brockport while wearing their turn-out gear.

Students were able to raise \$300 for cancer research through this event. The group visited Mercy Flight to explore how they respond to emergencies. The Youth Fire Group is planning a trip to New York City this spring.

Several graduates of Holley have gone through this program and are now paid firefighters or medics for ambulance services, and studying nursing or firefighting in college. "There aren't many youth groups like this across the country, but this group has been at Holley for seven years," said Clarendon Fire Assistant Chief Bob Freida. Holley Students Interact with Professionals

Sixth graders at Holley Elementary School had the opportunity to ask questions of professionals when they participated in two live webinars in October. The first session was the Heart of a Hall of Famer program with professional football player Will Shields and the second was the Scientists in Action: Ancient Mummies, New Discoveries program with archaeologist Dr. Michele Koons. Schools across the U.S. register to participate in the webinars, but only a handful are selected to participate in live question and answer sessions with the featured speakers in each presentation.

Tara Grillo's class participated in the session with Shields, who was an offensive player for

the Kansas City Chiefs. Students researched information about him before drafting their questions. They listened to a presentation from Shields, who spoke about the traits of integrity, character and pursuing excellence to encourage students to make good choices in life. As time allowed, various students from the class stepped up to the webcam and asked him questions about his career and the lessons he's learned from it.

A cross-section of sixth graders from all the classes at Holley met in Grillo's room to participate in the second webinar with Dr. Koons, curator of archaeology at the Denver Museum of Nature & Science. She showed

students photos of various kinds of mummies and spoke about the different scientific strategies used to determine information about them. Students asked her several questions about her methods and experiences on archaeological digs. This webinar helped them kick off their unit on early civilizations.

Students enjoyed their moments on the "big screen" as they interacted with the professionals. It was eye-opening for them to gain insight into classrooms across the U.S. as they watched other students participate in the webinar. Holley Elementary School was very fortunate to be chosen to participate in two webinars in the same week!



Alternative High School Hosts Thanksgiving Feast



Students from the Alternative High School hosted a Thanksgiving Feast for their families on Nov. 26 in the Holley Elementary Café. They prepared all of the side dishes, including stuffing, corn casserole and potatoes, and they also made all of the desserts. They learned how to prepare and carve the turkeys alongside the cafeteria staff.

There are currently 22 students in the program, and many of their families attended the Feast. Students eagerly pointed out which dishes they prepared to their families. They proudly introduced the Holley faculty and staff members to their families as part of their extended "family" support system at school. For students whose family members couldn't attend the feast, faculty and staff members dined with them.

Students in the Alt High program are ones who aren't as successful in the structure of traditional high school and benefit from smaller classes and more individual attention. Some of the students transition to attending Holley MS/HS for part of the day or attend Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES Career and Technical Education for half a day and then spend the rest of their day at the Alt High, which is housed in the Holley Elementary School building. When the students graduate from the Alt High program, many of them attend community college, join the military or accept employment. These students learn to create their own definitions of success and become independent. A lot of them enjoyed the opportunity to showcase their culinary skills at the Thanksgiving Feast.

Your child may be a victim of bullying if he/she:

- Comes home from school with torn or dirty clothing, or damaged books
- Has cuts, bruises or scratches
- Has few, if any, friends
- Seems afraid to go to school, complains
- Has nondescript illnesses
- Has trouble sleeping
- Loses interest in schoolwork
- Seems sad or depressed, moody
- Is anxious
- Has poor self-esteem
- Is quiet, sensitive or passive.

Your child may be bullying others if he/she:

- Teases, threatens or is physical with others
- Is hot-tempered or impulsive
- Has a hard time following rules
- Is aggressive toward adults
- Lacks sympathy for others
- Has been involved in antisocial behaviors, such as theft or vandalism
- Is quick to blame others.

Local Author Visits MS/HS Students

On Oct. 18, Holley MS/HS students had the chance to spend the day with a local author. Melissa Ostrom visited classes, had lunch with students, signed books and answered students' questions. She recently released her latest book, "Unleaving," which is about a 19-year-old who survives a violent assault in college, but faces backlash when she reports it. Ostrom's visit was made possible by a joint effort between the Holley MS/HS Library, Holley Rotary Club and the Holley Community Free Library.

The author first visited Melanie Richard's ninth grade English class and gave students a quick lesson on her writing process. Ostrom told students that she has an English literature degree and a master's degree in teaching. She taught English for 11 years at Kendall Central Schools before she quit to raise her kids. She started writing for herself, which led to her new path as a published author. She currently has a two-book deal with Macmillan Publishers; her first book was "The Beloved Wild."

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She also teaches writing courses part-time at Genesee Community College.

Next, she visited Kellie Burke's Creative Writing class and held a question and answer session with students. She found out what kinds of writing this small class of students was interested in. "If you write a couple hundred words a day, that is so helpful to your development as a writer," she said. "If you read a lot, you can be a writer." Ostrom had the class complete a short writing exercise about a memory of a room in a house that is important to them. She encouraged students to keep a journal of ideas for stories. "Questions are good places to start," she said. "Write down what details you notice about your surroundings or bits of overheard conversations. Make characters come alive to you ... they should become your friends in your mind."

Right before lunch, she visited Suzanne Lepkowski's ninth grade English class. Students had read passages from "Unleaving" and created public service announcements (PSAs) about teen issues. They created brochures and videos in small groups and presented the PSAs to Ostrom.

Students in the Library Club, as well as other interested students, faculty, staff and community members, ate lunch with Ostrom. Following the lunch, attendees had a chance to purchase Ostrom's books and have them signed by her. "This was a wonderful opportunity for our students and the Holley community," said MS/HS Library Media Specialist Lisa Osur.
