The Holley Boys' Varsity Soccer team played against Kendall on Oct. 31 at Holley. Holley won the game with a score of 3-0.

The Lady Hawks ended the season by capturing the Genesee-Region (G-R) Division 1 championship, and they advanced to the Section V Class C1 semifinals, where they lost to Avon, finishing with an overall 12-2-2 record. The last time the Lady Hawks received a Division 1 championship title was 11 years ago. Halee Passarell was named to 2nd Team All-State for Class C, and Halee, along with Kayleigh Neale, Samantha Bates and Emma Brady made the G-R All-Star team.



The Hawks ended their season by advancing to the Section V Class C1 championship, where they lost to East Rochester, finishing with an overall 11-4-1 record. If you plan on attending a college out of state, some colleges require you to take an accu-placer test. Due to COVID-19, most colleges are waiving the SAT/ACT tests for college acceptance. Please contact your college directly for admission requirements. If you have questions, please review the applicable college website or contact your counselor. Please inform your counselor as to which college(s) you have been accepted to.
