# A Message from the Superintendent



Happy New Year, Holley Families!

I hope this issue of the Dimension finds you well and excited for 2022!

All of us at school are excited for what this year will bring, and we're proud to be your

educational partner for our wonderful students.

One new aspect of this year will be our ability to test students at school, if they're quarantined by the health department, to find out if they can attend school in-person. We hope that the new "test to stay" option provides greater opportunity for our students to remain in school and confirm they are healthy after having contact with people who tested positive for COVID-19.

This year, we are also preparing for a capital improvement project for our school district. The project will involve multiple stages, the first of which has already occurred. Following an architect inspection of our district's buildings and grounds, we have identified some

preliminary updates and improvements that will have to be addressed. The next stage is currently underway, which is to determine other priorities and interests for this project, and the financial requirements for the proposed work.

Our goals for this upcoming capital improvement project will be to take care of our school district's infrastructure; provide for repairs, updates and enhancements; and improve our district's overall safety and security. By utilizing reserve funds and receiving building aid from New York State, we plan to have no impact on taxes to achieve our goals for this project.

This winter and early spring, we have some important work in front of us for this capital improvement project to occur. The first will be a series of meetings, where we will come together to make decisions and prioritize our list of potential improvements. We will be looking for community input for this process. If you are interested in being on a capital improvement project committee for our district, please contact Connie Nenni at District Office at 638-6316, extension 2003.

At our annual budget vote in May, we will have an additional proposition, similar to propositions for school bus replacement purchases and community library budget, to establish a "capital reserve fund," which acts like a savings account for our district. Along with aid from NYS, this reserve fund will be used to complete the capital improvement project so there is no impact to taxpayers. There will be more information forthcoming about establishing our capital reserve fund and capital improvement project plans as we move closer to spring.

As always, thank you for your continued support of the Holley Central School District. We are grateful for that support, and we are proud to have the opportunity to educate the students of Holley.

## Pre-K and Kindergarten Registration on March 16

Holley Pre-K and Kindergarten Registration will occur on Wednesday, March 16, from 1-5 p.m.

**only.** Registration will be held in the Elementary Library Classroom. Bring the following documents to register your child: birth certificate, immunization record and proof of residency (for example, utility bill). You will not be able to register without these documents.

Pre-K and Kindergarten health physicals are required to be completed by September 1, 2022.

**No Pre-K registration will be allowed before March 16.**

To be eligible to register for Pre-K, children must be 4 years old by December 1, 2022. To be eligible to register for Kindergarten, children must be 5 years old by December 1, 2022.

# ES Students Travel the Globe

Holley Elementary School students have racked up the miles this fall while visiting different classrooms around New York State, several museums around the country, ancient civilizations around the world, and even Santa at the North Pole!

Earlier this fall, some of our second graders joined with other students from around the country to connect with the Grace Museum in Abilene, TX for an interactive read-aloud. A wonderful storyteller from the museum read "Creepy Carrots" by Aaron Reynolds, a story about a young rabbit who sees carrots in every shadow. Students were then challenged to guess and draw the shadows created by various interesting objects. We also learned all about the climate and geography of Texas ... it's quite different from Western New York!

Marissa Lipka's sixth grade social studies students journeyed back in time to ancient Mesopotamia with an expert from the Penn Museum in Philadelphia. Students studied artifacts excavated



by museum archaeologists in the Middle East, depicting the development of the world's first cities. Students used knowledge previously learned during class to further explore the earliest settlements, temples, royal tombs and writings.

In November, each second grade student disguised a turkey. Disguises included turkey football players, princesses, pizza delivery men, superheroes, mermaids and boxes of popcorn. Students then connected with other second grade classrooms from around the state to play a game of "Guess Who." They practiced asking descriptive questions to "catch" each other's hidden birds.

In early December, second graders returned to Texas once again, joining over 1,000 students from around North America to visit the Don Harrington Discovery Center in Amarillo for a bit of "Christmas Chaos"! Museum scientists demonstrated several holiday experiments,

including how to create gingerbread slime, soap snow, dry ice snow globes, running milk and Northern Lights in a jar!

Finally, Mary Beach's class led all the kindergarteners and first graders on a trek to visit Santa at the North Pole! Santa read aloud "The Broken Ornament" by Tony DiTerlizzi, and then he answered students' questions about his reindeer, favorite snacks, and how he makes and delivers toys to children all around the world. We learned quite a bit of "insider information" about how Santa's magic works!

We can't wait to see where else our students will travel to in the spring! We would like to give a big Holley thank you to Donna Farren, our Distance Learning Specialist friend at Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES, and the New York State Distance Learning Consortium for helping to coordinate all our virtual field trips and class-to-class connections!



## Day of Helpers at MS/HS

On Dec. 10, MS/HS students listened to speakers from various professions talk about how they help their communities. Students had a half day of school, so they spent 20 minutes in each classroom watching presentations from law enforcement, medical personnel, rescue organizations, Board of Education members and non-profit groups.
