March Was Full of Music at Holley

Students in grades 4-12 performed in two concerts to highlight March as Music in Our Schools Month. The District Choral Groups performed the evening of March 28 in the M/HS Auditorium, with students from all vocal groups performing the song "Bonse Aba" together. The District Concert Bands performed the evening of March 30, with students from all bands performing two songs together: "Hogan's Heroes" and "Summon the Heroes." In combined groupings at each concert, more than 100 students performing together created impressive walls of sound.

On March 31, ES students attended a performance of Pre-K-grade 6 students performing music in various ensembles in the M/HS Auditorium. The Elementary Concert Band and Choir gave repeat performances of one

song apiece from concerts earlier in the month. Students in various grade levels played songs on recorders, guitars and ukuleles. Many students who did not play instruments accompanied their classes by singing their assigned songs. Second graders performed using ribbons to dance to their song. First graders acted out a musical story on stage. A variety of musical talents were on display during this lively assembly.

All performances in March gave students a chance to show off the skills they've learned through hours of practice. The concerts also demonstrated the musical progression these students can make throughout the years as they advance through the music program at Holley.

Genesee Promise Plus

Genesee Promise Plus is a special program designed specifically for high school students who are graduating in June 2023 from a high school located in Genesee, Livingston, Orleans and Wyoming (GLOW) counties in New York State. Under Genesee Promise Plus, every GLOW area June 2023 high school graduate will receive a scholarship covering the cost of tuition and fees for one or two summer 2023 courses offered by Genesee Community College at any of its campus locations in Arcade, Batavia, Dansville, Lima, Medina and Warsaw. Students are responsible for purchasing required textbooks; the scholarship doesn't cover these costs.

In addition, all 2023 high school juniors are eligible to receive a scholarship covering the cost of tuition and fees for two college courses during the summer between their junior and senior year.

ES Participates in One School, One Book Initiative

The Elementary School (ES) is participating in the One School, One Book initiative by reading "The World According to Humphrey" by Betty G. Birney this year. Every student and adult in the building received a copy of the book, with different grade levels partnering together to participate in various activities throughout the school year. Students read specific chapters of the book each week. They will bring their books home to add to their home libraries at the end of the year.

The book tells the story of hamster Humphrey, the class pet for Room 26, who makes a positive difference in the lives of students and staff at Longfellow School. The story touches on the themes of friendship, responsibility and open-mindedness, which directly correlates to the district's social-emotional learning and character education initiatives. Each classroom received a stuffed animal "Humphrey."

Students worked with their grade-level partners on three projects this year. They created triple word posters, postcards and final projects to display their favorite parts of the book. Each pairing of classes tackled the assignments differently. For the triple word posters, some classes cut out the letters of their words from newspapers, others wrote their words out, and another set selected pre-printed words and hamsters to color, cut and paste onto their posters. All students accompanied their words with artwork depicting why they selected that word, which was repeated three times on their posters, just like Humphrey stated a word three times for emphasis in the book.

This annual initiative is something the ES is proud of, as it allows students and staff to build connections and relationships school-wide through the common thread of literature.







Author Visits Fourth Graders

Author Andrew McCormack visited fourth grade classes on March 13 to read from his book "The



Other Side of the Fence." The story focuses on Ollie the dog and his adventures in the neighborhood, including spending a brief time living with another family. Eighth Grade Teachers Sit in the Hot Seats for Midterm Review

On Jan. 19, to prepare for midterm exams, eighth grade students and teachers transformed the M/HS Auditorium into a game show entitled, "Are you smarter than an 8th grader?"

The contestants were eighth grade teachers Mark Thomas, Whitney Lagas, Dylan Sharpe, Katie Veremeychik, Lisa Tubinis, Jane DelGudico and Kayla Thrower. They were seated on stage at desks, armed with their white boards and dry erase markers, with questions from each subject area displayed behind them on the screen. Teachers also had three lifelines:

- Ask a student, where the virtual wheel was spun and landed on a random student's name to answer the question
- Ask the audience, where the contestant saw what percentage of the audience chose each answer to a question



• 50/50, where two of the incorrect multiple-choice options were eliminated as answers to a question

Students remained in the audience, and they participated in the game by responding

to questions using their laptops. They tried to answer correctly the most questions to prove that they are, in fact, smarter than their teachers and confident in their performance on midterm exams.

Questions were asked from each subject area: English, history, science, math, technology, Spanish and art. All questions were based on exam content.

If contestants answered one question incorrectly, they were eliminated. It quickly came down to two teachers, Lagas and Tubinis. Student Hayden Mullins answered 18 out of 19 questions correctly, tying with the remaining teachers. Student Grace Ou came in second with 17 guestions answered correctly.

The following school day, eighth grade teachers had to wear signs that read, "I am NOT SMARTER than my 8th Grade Students." Any students that answered more questions correctly than their teachers wore pins that read, "I am SMARTER than my 8th Grade Teachers."

"Teachers forget what it is like to be a middle school student," said Tubinis. "It's not easy having six or seven different subjects they need to retain information on. This gameshow was meant to be a fun and engaging way to relate to our students, and test if we, as teachers, know all the subject material and skills our eighth graders are expected to know. Students loved seeing us in the 'hot seat' for a change. I hope it also empowered our students by showing them that adults don't know everything, and it helped students gain confidence going into midterm week."

Holocaust Survivor's Story Inspires History Lessons

On Jan. 31, students in grades 7-12 gathered in their classrooms to participate in a Zoom session with 93-year-old Holocaust survivor Estelle Laughlin.

The special presentation was held in conjunction with International Holocaust Remembrance Day, which was on Jan. 27, marking 78 years since millions of Jewish people were liberated by Soviet forces. Laughlin's presentation was done in collaboration with the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum where she volunteers to support its mission of "keeping Holocaust memory alive while inspiring citizens and leaders to confront hatred, prevent genocide, and promote human dignity in our constantly changing world."

"This is a painful story to tell and a painful story to listen to," said Laughlin before she shared her experiences in the camps, what her family went through during the war and life after liberation. She was 13 years old when deportation began in Poland. Her mother cut her hair in attempt to make her look older because Jewish people under the age of 14 were being sentenced to death. Her father was a member of the resistance. Laughlin's family had prolonged deportation for a time until they succumbed to Nazi forces during the Warsaw ghetto uprising in 1943, when they were sent to Lublin-Majdanek concentration camp.

She was adamant in reminding students that when given the choice, it is important to choose love, not hate. It was difficult for students to understand how Laughlin remained optimistic and compassionate after surviving persecution.

After the presentation concluded, one student asked what happened to Laughlin's father. She said that he was killed in the gas chambers. Her answer was met with silence throughout the classrooms. That was the reality for 6 million Jews who were murdered by the Nazi regime from 1939-45.

Students resonated with Laughlin's words. "Her childhood was taken away completely," said ninth grader Sophia Galanti. "We were able to gain a deeper understanding of what went on and realize that we should be much more grateful. I admire her strength." Junior Jasmine Apicella said, "She found a way to use her experience to help other people."

The History Department developed specific lessons to provide context to students in preparation for, during and following the presentation. In history classes the next day, students participated in a debrief and learning activity.

A common thought throughout the classroom debriefs revolved around the "why." "Everyone nearby was just living their normal lives while Jewish people were living in camps and isolated from everyone," said 10th grader Natalie Foose. "Why didn't more of the German people speak up or try to help?"

Seventh and eighth graders completed a lesson where they created an infographic as if they were opening a Holocaust memorial in their local community, which challenged them to understand why and how the Holocaust happened. "It was much deeper than just an advertisement," said history teacher Nick D'Amuro. "Students really grasped how disinformation and hate can grow from something small we often dismiss into something much more dangerous."

Grades 9-12 focused on setting norms to combat anti-Semitism in the school community. Students were split into groups and each group was given a scenario where they witnessed anti-Semitic behaviors. Together, they discussed the best ways to react if they were in that situation. While it was a challenging discussion, they worked to establish norms to consider setting within their own school community to help combat hatred and empower belonging. "What students did agree on is that anti-Semitism and other negative stereotypes need to be pointed out and challenged by both adults and students," said history teacher Mike Crissman. "They wouldn't necessarily be changing anyone's attitudes, but they would be establishing what we, as a community, agree on as acceptable behavior."



First Grade Friendship Club

First graders meet once a week in the ES Cafeteria on Fridays for Friendship Club. In this club, students learn how to be a good friend to others, as well as the character traits for being a good citizen. Retired Holley Elementary School teacher Leslie Piedmonte started this program approximately 20 years ago.

On March 10, students watched a video that recounted the story of "The Little Engine That Could." They talked about trying to do something, even when it's hard or they think they can't do it. They sang a song about friendship before sitting down and writing a few sentences about their experiences of trying to do something and persevering through it. They also drew pictures of their attempts, such as riding a bike, or learning to swim or tie their shoes. Just like the train engine in the story, they learned they are more capable of doing things than they thought they were.



Assemblyman Hawley Speaks with Seniors

On March 10, Assemblyman Stephen Hawley gave a presentation to Holley seniors in the M/HS Auditorium. His visit was part of the curriculum for senior coursework in the Economics and Participation in Government classes.

Hawley has spent 17 years in office. His district covers the towns of Hamlin, Clarkson and Sweden; all of Orleans and Genesee Counties; and the town of Newstead and village of Akron in Erie County. He explained the role of a public servant to students. He told them that a desire to be involved in his community, and wanting to see things happen or not happen in his community, drove him to seek public office. Originally from Batavia, he ran his family farm and worked as a local businessman before becoming Assemblyman for Assembly District 139. Hawley comes from a long line of family members who have served in government positions, including those who worked for Governor Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Suffragist Susan B. Anthony and General Dwight D. Eisenhower. His father was part of the state assembly. He told students that anyone can be a representative in government. "My role is to build relationships with people, regardless of their political philosophies," he said.

When asked what he was most proud of in his role, Hawley told students about starting the



annual Patriots Trip to Washington, D.C., that allows veterans of war to visit national historic sites and landmarks. He also spoke about the Gold Star Family Bill he sponsored, which grants free college tuition to family members of a military person who dies while in service. He served in the military and is on the Veterans' Affairs Committee. In response to student questions, he told them he supports responsible gun ownership and the Second Amendment.

Hawley also related the story of fourth grade students from Byron-Bergen Central Schools approaching him to propose a state snack because one had not been declared up to that point. He helped them have yogurt approved as the official snack of New York State.

Students asked what he was currently working on, and he talked about the state budget. The fiscal year for the budget begins on April 1 each

year. Hawley explained that the majority party receives three times the budget of the minority party to run their offices in both Washington, D.C. and locally, with the budgets for both offices being the same. He told students his staff consists of two paid staff members in Albion, a college student who works as his intern in Albany, as well as a pre-law student who works as his executive assistant in Albany. He also relies on a number of friends who serve in unpaid roles to attend events he is invited to in his district. Hawley tries to attend as many events in-person as he can, often attending several different events in an evening.

He also explained to students about Medicare and Medicaid, citing Medicaid as the biggest expense in NYS, at \$88 billion annually. He has proposed a bill to split NYS into two states, with New York City as one, and the rest of the state as the other. Hawley explained he sees a need to do this as a way to control expenses and not spend all the revenue the state receives, but keep some of it in reserve.

His advice to students was to "be involved to effect change in your communities - volunteer, gain experience and learn about the issues so you can propose solutions."


Tech Wars 2023
