Girls' Soccer Team Crowned Regional Champions for First Time in School History

Team Secured First Sectional Title Since 1994

The Holley girls' varsity soccer championship banners hang high on the walls of the MS/ HS gymnasium where they have remained untouched for 29 years. This year, that changed. On Oct. 27, the Girls' Varsity Soccer team walked off the turf to an erupting Holley



an erupting Holley spectator section after defeating Williamson 2-1. This win earned the team the title of Section V Class C Division 1 Champions. It has been seven years since any Holley athletic team won

sectionals. The last time a Holley girls' soccer team brought home a sectional title was 1994, making this win even more unforgettable.

After earning consecutive league titles in 2021, 2022 and 2023, and appearing in the sectional finals in 2022, this year's squad was eager to have another chance at the sectional block. With only two losses, the No. 1 seeded Hawks breezed through sectional playoffs, outscoring their opponents 11-0 ahead of the finals.

From there, the Hawks went on to upset rival Byron-Bergen 3-2 in overtime in the Class C Crossover Game. This win earned Holley their ticket to the Far West Regional Final, meaning an appearance in the state tournament, something a Holley Girls' soccer team has never done. To capture the regional title, they defeated Frewsburg (Section VI) 2-0. This advanced Holley to the Final Four of the state tournament.

On Nov. 11, the team traveled over two hours to play Waterford-Halfmoon (Section II) in the semifinals. Holley was defeated 3-0, finishing their season with a 19-4 record.

"Even though we ended with a loss, I feel like we were still on a high. I was always excited to step on that field the first day and the last day, no matter what."



The 2023 team housed five Genesee Region All-Stars, with four named to the Section V All-Tournament team, five earning All Greater Rochester Area honors and two earning All-State honors (see page 8). Of the 25 players on the team, 11 members are seniors.

"Every single player contributed to this season's success," said senior forward and captain Samantha Bates who was the team's lead scorer with 31 goals in the 2023 season. "This is something we have been working toward and it is a great feeling." "They were able to come back from being down in several games without folding," said Coach Renee Wolf. "When you work together, you can make anything happen." Wolf has coached soccer and taught health at Holley MS/HS since 2005. She coached the junior varsity team for 10 years and varsity for the past eight. This year, she was named Section V Class C Coach of the Year. "I've truly enjoyed being their coach and I hope they know how proud I am," said Wolf.

The school and community showed endless support with student ticket fees covered by Holley Sports Boosters, a send-off parade from the Elementary School ahead of sectional finals, escorts from the Holley Murray Joint Fire District, and a MS/HS Pep Assembly ahead of the state semifinal game.

"They had such an impact on this season - our community supported us every step of the way," said Bates. "We will forever be thankful for them, they were truly our 12th man," said Wolf.

It is with mixed emotions that I have announced my retirement as Superintendent of the Holley Central School District, as of June 30, 2024. I have loved my time in Holley, and have come to truly appreciate the great people who are associated with this wonderful district and community. I am very proud to have had the opportunity to serve as your superintendent. I look forward to remaining committed to the plans we have for continuous improvement and academic achievement for all our students for the remainder of this school year. We will be scheduling projects through the fall of 2025, trying to have as little disruption to students' school experiences as possible. As work begins, we will inform the community of anything that could have an impact on schedules or facility usage.

We will be hosting various budget workshops that coincide with our regular Board of Education meetings, which are open to the public. We will also be hosting our annual budget hearing, where the 2024-25 budget will be presented, held on Tuesday, May 7, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. **The annual Budget Vote and Board of Education election will be held from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 21**.

As always, thank you for your continued support of the Holley Central School District. We are grateful for our families and we are proud to have the opportunity to educate the students of Holley.

To be selected to participate in this festival, the students had to complete a NYSSMA Solo Festival performance in the spring, achieve a high score, and have their teacher complete a recommendation and application on their behalf. A committee then selects the very best instrumental students from Orleans, Genesee, Wyoming, Monroe, Genesee Valley, Ontario and Wayne Counties.

"This is such an incredible experience for our students because it is an opportunity to experience making music at a high level with students of the same age from all over the region," said Holley MS/HS Band Director Zach Busch. "These students spend months practicing and perfecting their solos, scales and sight-reading. They have a work ethic and dedication to their craft that sets them apart." Aidan Kelley and Harrison Flanagan were also selected for last year's Area All-State Junior High Band. "We love music and it's a goal of ours for the year," said Aidan. "We mostly prepare independently. Practicing can be a pain, but there are ways to make it fun." "It was a lot of practice," said Harrison, who suggests practicing songs you like to keep it interesting. "We are working to be good enough for All-State in senior high."

The band this year consisted of 85 students, much larger than most of the schools in the area. It was conducted by Dr. Adam Brennan of Mansfield University in Pennsylvania. Students in the ensemble performed a variety of music from standards in the concert band repertoire to contemporary music, including the premier of Dr. Brennan's newest work, entitled "Whimsy."

Students Inducted into National Honor Society

The Holley High School National Honor Society (NHS) held its Induction Ceremony in the MS/HS Auditorium on the evening of Nov. 16, where seven students were honored. To be considered, 11th and 12th grade students with an academic average of 90 percent or higher can submit an application to the faculty selection committee to show how they demonstrate the four pillars of NHS membership: scholarship, service, character and leadership.

Current NHS members began the ceremony with a candlelight procession from the back of the auditorium. New inductees were called forward and escorted by current NHS members out of the auditorium to change into their gowns. When they returned, new inductees joined current NHS members on stage. NHS officers then lit the four ceremonial candles, symbolic of each pillar of membership, and described their meaning.

When the inductees' names were announced, they received their membership certificates from Principal Matthew Feldman and signed their names in the book that maintains a record of every NHS inductee since 1938. Superintendent Brian Bartalo distributed membership pins to students' family members. New inductees were then pinned by their family members before taking the NHS oath of membership as a group.

This year, students invited former Holley social studies teacher Nicholas D'Amuro to speak at the ceremony. D'Amuro has his master's degree in history from SUNY Geneseo. He taught many of the inductees during



his 10 years at Holley. "I had the privilege of watching you grow from wild-eyed middle schoolers into the young men and women that sit here tonight," said D'Amuro. He encouraged them to live in the present moment, and he spoke about the pillars, putting them into perspective. "The best leaders know they do not have all the answers, instead, they know where to find those answers and who to lean on when different challenges arise. I encourage you to choose colleagues with different ideas, listen carefully and speak with honesty." He went on to reference historic figures and their exemplary action so he emphasized,

You should never underestimate your capacity for change. Where others shy away from the challenge, be the one who reaches for it.



"Rarely are the right decisions easy decisions," said Principal Feldman as he congratulated the inductees. "Part of being in the NHS requires looking into your character. Tomorrow when you come into school, what decision are you going to make that creates a positive contribution to our community?"

Two Students Inducted into CTE National Technical Honor Society

On November 28, Holley High School students Grace Fuller and Jaxson Schicker were inducted into the Monroe 2-Orleans (BOCES 2) Career and Technical Education (CTE) National Technical Honor Society (NTHS). Grace studies Nurse Assisting and Associated Health Careers and Jaxson studies Welding. The induction took place at the BOCES 2 Educational Services Center where they were honored alongside more than 70 students, the largest class of honorees BOCES 2 CTE has ever inducted.

Each year, the NTHS honors the achievements of the top CTE students across the country. Membership in NTHS is one of the highest honors a CTE student can attain. This national organization recognizes



outstanding CTE students who have distinguished themselves academically in their chosen fields, and who possess qualities such as leadership, citizenship, honesty, and responsibility. Criteria includes: an 85% or above average in their CTE program; an excellent attendance record; a high standard of personal conduct in their home school and at CTE; a CTE teacher recommendation; and be on track to both complete their CTE program and graduate at the end of the second year of their CTE program.

During the event, the participants get the chance to compete in adapted recreational activities like Archery, Track & Field, Power Wheelchair, Obstacle Courses and more. Holley students served as buddies where they were either partnered up with a participant or assigned to a station where they assisted the participants throughout the day.

"It feels good to help other people," said Luminara Virgillio, a senior on the cheer squad and first year volunteering at the event. "We would hold their hand when they walked across the balance beam or help them throw a ball. We are working with kids who have possibly been put down their whole lives for something that they can't control, and it is really fun and empowering to be able to show them what they are capable of."



Holley Varsity Cheerleading began volunteering at this event over 10 years ago when Cheer Coach and MS/HS Administrative Assistant Penny Cole initially formed the partnership, giving studentathletes a chance to give back to their community.

"We are there to lift their spirits," said Bella Emery, a junior on the cheer team and her second year volunteering. "I think about how I would feel if I was not able to do things like cheerleading. Volunteering in this event has made me want to do more to help others."

"The games are a great opportunity for participants to see other kids who might struggle with the same issues as them and know that they are not alone," added Virgillio. There is no cost to participants or spectators at the Empire State Games thanks to sponsors and volunteers. This partnership has evolved to where the event organizers have requested more volunteers, and for years now, the girls' soccer team has accompanied the cheerleading team. This year was the first time the boys' soccer team joined. It has become an activity that is highly anticipated by the student-athletes, making them more inclined to step up when other volunteer opportunities arise.

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Esports: Now streaming at Holley

Esports, short for electronic sports, was first offered to high school students at the MS/HS as an extracurricular activity in the spring of 2023. It offers students the chance to team up and compete



virtually in real time against other schools in the Northeastern U.S. While there are a multitude of games to choose from, Holley kicked off their inaugural season with Rocket League, a video game described as a version of soccer using racecars, where students work as a team, typically 3 on 3, to score goals. For the fall 2023 season, participants chose to navigate a different game: Apex Legends. Apex is a character-driven, squad-based game. It blends last-man-standing gameplay with the exploration and scavenging elements of a survival game.

When competing in multi-player video games, students exercise collaboration, problem-solving, critical thinking, communication and leadership skills. The program also helps to foster a sense of belonging and brings together students with different interests. Federal funding allowed for the Esports room to be equipped with new high-performing gaming computers, controllers, chairs, and more. With a growing number of middle school students eager to get involved, the school has high hopes for the future of the program.

Introducing Mrs. C's Mathletes

There is a new and engaging after school program for fifth and sixth graders at Holley Elementary. Mathletes is designed to challenge students to achieve their maximum potential, in a space that is conducive to learning. This program helps teach important skills like collaboration, curiosity, and teamwork. Students play math games that challenge them to excel through mental math, speed and critical thinking. Students work together on logic problems, 24 math challenge cards, national math challenges, and

other online resources. These exercises help children to complete math problems in the real world and encourage them to consider science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) career pathways. The program is led by Jenna Chevier who is a Math Response to Intervention (RTI) Teaching Assistant at the ES. It is offered on Tuesdays from 3:30 to 5 p.m. in room 10.
