Sept. 11	National Day of Service and Remembrance/September 11th	A day to honor those who lost their lives on the September 11, 2001 attacks.
Sept. 12	Enkutatash (Ethiopian New Year)	Celebrated as the end of the rainy season and by Rastafarians.
Sept. 15-Sept. 17	Rosh Hashanah (Judaism)	Celebration of the Jewish New Year, it begins after sundown on the 25th. It is a time for introspection.
Sept. 15-Oct. 15	Hispanic Heritage Month	This month honors the culture and contributions of both Hispanic and Latino Americans.
Sept. 18	International Equal Pay Day	Established by the United Nations to work towards equal pay for work of equal value.
Sept. 20	He for She Day	A day established by the United Nations to promote gender equity through cooperation with allies.
Sept. 22	American Business Women  Day	Recognizes the achievements of women in business.

Sept. 24- Sept. 25	Yom Kippur (Judaism)	Begins on sundown of the 24th. The holiest day on the Jewish calendar, a day of atonement marked by fasting and ceremonial repentance. Work is prohibited.
Sept. 29- Oct. 7	Sukkot (Judaism)	Seven Day Jewish Festival giving thanks for the fall harvest.

Oct. 4	St. Francis Day (Christian)	Feast of St Francis of Assisi, saint of animals and the environment. Celebrated by some Catholic denominations.
Oct. 9	Indigenous Peoples' Day	Formerly Columbus Day- meant to celebrate the contributions of Indigenous populations.
Oct. 10	World Mental Health Day (people with disabilities)	Promotes mental health awareness and education, and advocates against social stigma relating to mental health
Oct. 11	National Coming Out Day	Celebrating LGBTQIA+ for those who identify. Also commemorates the 1987 March on Washington.
Oct. 18	International Pronouns Day	Meant to bring awareness and make sharing, educating, and respecting everyone's pronouns common place.
Oct. 19	Spirit Day (LGBTQ+)	Wear purple on this day to support LGBTQ youth and speak out against bullying
Oct. 31	<u>Halloween</u>	Began as a Celtic holiday to ward off evil spirits. It is often not celebrated by many Christian denominations.
Oct. 31	Reformation Day (Christianity)	A Protestant Christian religious holiday celebrated alongside All Hallows' Eve (Halloween) during the triduum of all Hallowtide in remembrance of the onset of the Reformation.

Nov. 2	<u>Dia de los Muertos</u>	Day of the Dead is a Mexican holiday celebrating the day when the gates of Heaven are open and they welcome back the soul of their dead relatives.
Nov. 10	US Marine Corps Birthday	Celebrates the date in 1775 when the Marine Corps was formed in Philadelphia by the Second Continental Congress. Every year the Marines celebrate with a ball.

Nov. 11	Veterans Day/Armistice Day	Veterans Day, observed annually on November 11, is a tribute to military veterans who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces.
Nov. 11-18	National Hunger and Homeless Awareness Week	This week was created with the hopes of educating Americans about hunger and homelessness and encouraging service and action to work to eradicate them.
Nov. 12	<u>Diwali (Hindu/Sikh)</u>	The Hindu, Jain, and Sikh five-day festival of lights that celebrates new beginnings and the triumph of good over evil and lightness over darkness.
Nov. 14	World Diabetes Day	Established to recognize the escalating health threat posed by diabetes.
Nov. 16	International Tolerance Day	The International Day of Tolerance is created as a way to commemorate the passing of The Declaration of Principles on Tolerance.
Nov. 16	National Rural Health Day	This day was created to celebrate rural healthcare providers and highlight the unique healthcare challenges of rural areas
Nov. 20	Transgender Day of Remembrance	This is a day to honor the memory of transgender people who lost their lives to violence as well as advocate for transgender rights.
Nov. 23	Thanksgiving Day	The day is meant to celebrate the harvest season and other blessings of the year gone by.
Nov. 24	Native American Heritage Day	A civil holiday that pays tribute to Native Americans for their many contributions to the United States and recognizes them as the first people of our nation.
Nov. 30	Native Women's Equal Pay Day	Brings awareness that Native women are paid 50 cents for every dollar paid to white men.
Nov. 13-19	Transgender Awareness Week	Transgender Awareness Week is a week when transgender people and their allies educate the public about who transgender people are, sharing stories and experiences, and advancing advocacy around the issues of prejudice, discrimination, and violence that affect the transgender community.

Dec. 1	Rosa Parks Day	Celebrates the day in 1955 when Rosa Parks refused to move to the back of a public bus in Montgomery, Alabama.

Dec. 1	World AIDS Day	Dedicated to spreading awareness of HIV and AIDS and mourning the loss of the estimated 40 million people who have died of AIDS since 1981.
Dec. 1-7	Crohn's and Colitis awareness Week	This week is to educate people about and support people dealing with Crohn's and Colitis.
Dec. 2	Special Education Day	This day commemorates the signing of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) in 1975. IDEA requires public schools to provide a free appropriate public education to students with disabilities.
Dec. 3	International Day of People with Disabilities	Started by the United Nations, this day is meant to celebrate the lives of people with disabilities and raise awareness about their needs.
Dec. 3	First Day of Advent	Advent begins the season when Christians prepare for the birth of Christ. It begins the 4th Sunday before Christmas each year.
Dec. 7- Dec. 15	Hanukkah begins at sundown (Judaism)	Hanukkah celebrates the re-dedication of the temple in Jerusalem. It is an 8 day celebration that includes traditional food and games, gifts, and the lighting of the menorah.
Dec. 8	Bodhi Day	Celebrates the day when Siddhartha Gautama, the Historic Buddha, achieved enlightenment.
Dec. 15	Bill of Rights Day	This day commemorates the ratification of the first 10 amendments to the U.S. Constitution in 1791.
Dec. 25	<u>Christmas</u>	Christian holiday that celebrates the birth of Jesus of Nazareth.

Jan. 4	World Braille Day	World Braille Day, observed to raise awareness of the importance of Braille as a means of communication for blind and partially sighted people; celebrated on the birthday of Louis Braille, the inventor of Braille.
Jan. 15	Makar Sankranti (Hindu)	Makar Sankranti is a Hindu festival that's dedicated to the Hindu religious sun god,

		Surya. It is often celebrated with morning prayer followed by kite games and competitions. <b>Date may vary.</b>
Jan. 15	Martin Luther King Jr. Day	Martin Luther King Jr. Day celebrates one of the greatest American leaders of the civil rights movement.
Jan. 24-25	Tu B'shevat (Judaism)	Jewish holiday recognizing "The New Year of the Trees." It is celebrated on the fifteenth day of the Hebrew month of Shevat. In Israel, the flowering of the almond tree usually coincides with this holiday, which is celebrated by planting trees and eating dried fruits and nuts.
Jan. 27	UN Holocaust Memorial Day	The International Day of Commemoration to remember the victims of the Holocaust; the anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz death camp in 1945 and UN Holocaust Memorial Day

Feb. 1	National Freedom Day	National Freedom Day, which celebrates the signing of the Thirteenth Amendment, which abolished slavery in the United States in 1865.
Feb. 10	Lunar New Year	Lunar New Year, one of the most sacred of all traditional Chinese holidays, a time of family reunion and celebration. The Lunar New Year is also celebrated at this time in Japan, Korea, Vietnam, and Mongolia.
Feb. 14	<u>Valentine's Day</u>	St. Valentine's Day, a Western Christian feast day honoring one or two early saints named Valentinus. This holiday is typically associated with romantic love and celebrated by people expressing their love with gifts.
Feb. 14	Ash Wednesday (Christian)	Marks the beginning of Lent. It focuses the Christian's heart on repentance and prayer, usually through personal and communal confession.
Feb. 15	Nirvana Day (Buddhism)	Also known as Parinirvana, this day is the annual festival that commemorates the death of Buddha after he reached his final nirvana. Buddhists often celebrate this day by visiting Buddhist temples or monasteries and meditating. If you're not Buddhist and want to celebrate the day, spend some time in meditation!

Feb. 19	<u>Presidents Day</u>	Presidents' Day, or Washington's Birthday at the federal governmental level, is a holiday in the United States celebrated on the third Monday of February to honor all persons who served as presidents.
Feb. 20	World Day of Social Justice	Social Justice Day is meant to remind people that advocacy and activism is what love and justice looks like. It is to uphold the principles of social justice by promoting gender equality, and the rights of indigenous peoples and migrants; it is meant to advance social justice by dismantling and removing barriers that people face because of gender, age, race, ethnicity, religion, culture or disability.
Feb. 21	International Mother Language Day	It is a worldwide annual observance to promote awareness of linguistic and cultural diversity and promote multilingualism. Linguistic diversity is increasingly threatened as more and more languages disappear. One language disappears on average every two weeks, taking with it an entire cultural and intellectual heritage.
