Mental Health Minute

Throughout the course of a student's life, they will encounter a variety of different things ranging from great friendship to difficult conflicts. During adolescence students may struggle to see perspective outside of their own world. It can be very easy for a student to get wrapped up in the drama or a conflict happening in their life, losing sight of the bigger picture. This can be conflict with a peer, a teacher, or a family member. To the student the world may feel like it is ending, but as adults we know that this conflict is part of life. When helping your child work through these conflicts, it can be helpful to review with them the size of the problem. Is this problem a big deal, little deal, or not their deal at all?

Big Deal: A big deal on paper is the easiest thing for a student to identify. A big deal is when a person's safety is at risk. This means that if your child is in danger of being hurt by someone, hurting themselves, hurting someone else, or someone that they know is in danger, then this is a big deal. It is an important time to review with your child that this is when they need to tell a safe adult immediately. This can be someone at home or at school that they trust will keep them safe.

Little Deal: A little deal is the most common problem a student will face. While it may often feel like a big deal to the student, no one is in immediate danger, and it is something that they will be able to work through. An example of a little deal may be that your child has gotten in a fight with their long-time friend. While this is very upsetting to the student, no one is in immediate danger, and it is something the student can work through with various coping strategies. The term "little deal" should not be confused with minimizing the situation. We are not trying to convey to the student that their issue is not important. The main message is that while this is very important to them, no one is in danger, and this situation can be handled at an appropriate time, it is not an emergency.

Not their deal: This is the most confusing area for students to comprehend. Your child will feel a sense of loyalty to their friends, which is a positive, but can quickly turn into a problem. Students easily get wrapped up in the drama happening between two friends. This can turn into taking sides and often consume much of your child's thoughts and time. Your child may send a snapchat to someone, their idea of defending their friend, but it ends up inserting them into the drama. This can lead to consequences or more issues for your student. If your child comes to you with a situation happening between two other people you can remind them it is not their deal, and these two people will need to work it out. Unless someone is in danger, they do not need to get involved.

Students will go through conflict and drama in their lives, and this is a very normal thing. It is important that when they are experiencing these taxing emotional situations, as adults we validate their feelings, but work with them on the size of the problem. Helping students put these things in perspective can allow them to create healthy habits when it comes to problem-solving. Learning these skills now will only help them as they enter adulthood!
