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

High School Students Host December Day of Caring

The Interact Club and High School Student Council conducted a collection drive for their first Day of Caring in December. They collected needed items for Elderwood of Lakeside, PAWS Animal Shelter and Holley Community Center. Forty-three students sacrificed their first day of holiday recess on Dec. 23 to deliver donated items to all three organizations and work at each location. They washed dishes; played with, walked and cleaned up after shelter dogs; unloaded pet food; met with nursing

home residents; and performed random acts of kindness in the community. These random acts included leaving over \$300 worth of gift cards in various amounts on people's cars. High school students asked to do a Day of Caring this year, and they worked with the Holley Rotary Club and Interact Club Advisor Samantha Zelent to coordinate the activities. Petitions for Board of Education

Any district resident interested in running for the Holley Central School District Board of Education must submit a petition on or before 5 p.m. on April 20, 2020. Petitions are available in the District Office or by calling District Clerk Connie Nenni at 638-6316, extension 2003. The petition must be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of Holley Central School District. The petition may be submitted at any time during business hours to the District Clerk, as long as the deadline of April 20 at 5 p.m. is met.

The two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be elected to three-year terms of office commencing on July 1, 2020. Current board members Robin Silvis and Andrea Newman have terms that expire on June 30, 2020.

The school budget vote and board member election is on Tuesday, May 19 from 6 a.m.-9 p.m. in the Holley Middle School/High School Foyer.

Pre-K and Kindergarten Registration on March 18

Holley Pre-K and Kindergarten Registration will occur on Wednesday, March 18 from 1-5 p.m. **only**. Registration will be held in the Elementary Library Classroom. Bring the following documents to register your child: birth certificate, immunization record and proof of residency (for example, utility bill). You will **not** be able to register without these documents.

Pre-K and Kindergarten health physicals are required to be completed by September 1, 2020.

No Pre-K registration will be allowed before March 18.

To be eligible to register for Pre-K, children must be 4 years old by December 1, 2020. To be eligible to register for Kindergarten, children must be 5 years old by December 1, 2020.

AMPED Class Takes Trip to Optimax

Our Algebra, Manufacturing, Production, Entrepreneurship and Design (AMPED) class visited Optimax on Jan. 9. We met with members of the Optimax team who provided a history of the company, discussed what they manufacture and who they manufacture for, the skill sets needed to work there, and the career opportunities available. We toured the facility in small groups and attended a Q&A session. Our students asked a lot of great questions!

The Optimax team showed our students how the business and math concepts we are learning in class are used in the "real-world." Students learned how Optimax applies lean manufacturing theory to their processes and constantly looks for ways to improve. Members of the Optimax team demonstrated how important several math and business concepts are to their processes. It was a great trip!



New Character Trait Initiatives at the ES: Positivity Project and Principal's Chair

The Positivity Project is a new initiative this year for students in kindergarten-grade 6. Students participate in daily mini-lessons to learn about the weekly character traits. These traits have included curiosity, teamwork, perspective, kindness, bravery and gratitude. Overall, the theme of the project is that other people matter. All teachers that a student interacts with reinforce the weekly character trait, so that even when a student travels to the art and music rooms, the gym or the library, they are learning about the character trait for the week. At the end of each week, a student is selected by their teacher to receive a certificate for going above and beyond demonstrating the trait of the week. To accompany our character education efforts, a new reward for students is the Principal's Chair. Students who go above and beyond with their consistent demonstration of positivity character traits are nominated by staff members to sit in Assistant Principal Tim Artessa's chair for the day. Students who are nominated are announced at the end of morning announcements, and then the chair is delivered to their classroom. The student is presented the chair by Artessa or Principal Karri Schiavone. Students also receive an ice cream ticket and a few other treats to go along with the privilege of sitting in the chair for the day.



Real-Life Applications Class

The Real-Life Applications class is in its second year. The class covers a variety of topics that students will need to learn about as they become adults. Think of it as "Adulting 101."

Topics include career planning (resume writing, interviewing, career research), personal financial planning (budgeting, student loans, using credit, investing), cooking (meal planning, nutritional information, grocery shopping), and major life events and purchases (planning a wedding or funeral, buying a car, purchasing housing, financing college). We ask students if there are any topics they would like to cover during the year. Last year's class wanted to learn the steps to make a doctor's appointment.

Students select a career in the beginning of the year, and many of the projects that we do throughout the year are tied to that career. For example, students research the type of car that they would like to buy, but their choice also needs to be affordable based on the career that they select.

Grillos Inducted Into Sports Hall of Fame

The Holley Sports Boosters inducted father and son duo John and Andrew Grillo into the Holley Hall of Fame on Jan. 7. Both were inducted for their many contributions to athletics at Holley Central School District.

Oldest brother Ashley John Grillo recounted the many accomplishments of his father and brother during the induction ceremony. Andrew was honored for his years as a student-athlete on the tennis and wrestling teams. He wrestled on the varsity team for five years, resulting in a 186-11 record that includes four Genesee Region titles and four Section V championships. He was a league All-Star four times and received the Most Outstanding Wrestler Award in his senior year. Andrew was also an Academic All-American. He was a state wrestling champion in his senior year at Holley with a 42-0 record; his banner still hangs in the MS/HS Gym. He was also a two-time Genesee Region All-Star in tennis.

In his acceptance speech, Andrew thanked his family, teammates and Sports Boosters. While his father was his coach, his older brothers, Ashley and Adam, were his biggest fans and toughest grappling opponents. "Adam was my training partner in my senior year, and he never allowed me to take him down," he said. "When I finally did, I knew I had earned it." All three brothers coached wrestling alongside their father for

many years. "He made us better wrestlers and better people," said Andrew.

John was a long-time wrestling and tennis coach for the district. He retired from 30 years of coaching in the 2018-19 school year. He was a Genesee Region Coach of the Year 16 times and a Section V Coach of the Year six times for wrestling. John has the most mat wins – 796 – of any coach in NYS. His coaching career in wrestling boasts 20 Genesee Region titles, 12 Section V championships and five state champions. He coached his tennis teams to 14 Genesee Region titles, two Section V championships and three Section V titles. He was a three-time Genesee Region Coach of the Year for tennis. He will be inducted into the Section V Wrestling Hall of Fame this spring. Sports

Boosters also announced that the first wrestling dual meet of the season will be named after John.

In his acceptance speech, John thanked the Sports Boosters and Holley Central School District. He encouraged others to join the Sports Boosters to make a difference. "This honor wouldn't be possible without the many great and dedicated athletes I coached throughout the years," said John. "This night isn't about me, it's about Andrew. He was the one who did a lot for this program, the only individual state champion in this school's history. He is the one who set the tone. He didn't want to be good, he wanted to be great. He worked hard in the off-season and did everything he possibly could to finish his career at the level he achieved."

Counseling News

Seniors Tip:

Students planning to apply to four-year colleges need to complete their applications ASAP. Those students planning to attend two-year colleges should be making appointments to take placement tests and meet with advisors if they have already applied and been accepted. If you plan on attending a college out of state, some colleges require you to take an accu-placer test. Please contact your college directly for admission requirements. Please inform your counselor as to which college(s) you have been accepted to. Don't forget to submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) located at www.fafsa.ed.gov! FAFSA is the source of all federal and state aid, loans and work study programs.

Get Ready, Juniors:

Now is the time to start thinking about plans after graduation. Counselors recently met with juniors to discuss their PSAT results, and create their accounts on www.collegeboard.com and www.actstudent.org for SAT and ACT exam registrations. Now is the time to register for these exams. Many four-year colleges require these exams as part of the admissions process. The Counseling Department website lists SAT/ACT prep sites. Career exploration and completion of college applications is currently underway.

Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) Test

This test will be administered at the MS/HS on Feb. 25. If you plan on enrolling in the military upon graduation, this test is mandatory. Any student in grades 10-12 who is interested in taking the exam needs to register with Kristina Tese in the Counseling Office. If you would like to know more about which careers you would be successful in, we recommend registering for the test. The test is free! The ASVAB workshop to review and discuss student results will be on March 5.
